- R1. MOTION TO APPROVE:** Sole Source Agreement No 14-004 between South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) and Cubic Transportation Systems, Inc. to procure additional fare collection equipment and spare parts in the amount of \$2,319,452.00.

Mr. Giulietti stated that this contract was originally a competitive bid. The purchase of additional fare collection equipment is necessary due to the new Miami station, growth demands and spare parts. This is a "Sole Source" due to having the machines designed to accommodate SFRTA system needs.

Board Member Jim Cummings moved for approval. The motion was seconded by Mayor Kristin Jacobs.

The Chair called for further discussion and/or opposition to the motion. Upon hearing none, the Chair declared the motion carried unanimously.

- R2. MOTION TO APPROVE:** Delegation to the Executive Director to enter into any and all agreements associated with SFRTA Headquarters air quality remediation efforts in excess of his current spending authority in an amount not to exceed \$ 275,000.

Mr. Giulietti stated that the internal air quality has some mold issues due to the air conditioning ducts and that some dry wall will need to be removed and replaced. Currently, there are air scrubbers operating throughout the building. SFRTA is working with the landlord and anticipates

some costs. Mr. Giulietti informed that Board Member Frione has volunteered to overlook the work.

Board Member Frione requested that the final report be provided prior to moving forward.

Ms. Teresa Moore stated that the final report will be completed and provided within a couple of weeks.

Board Member Cummings inquired as to the responsibility of the air conditioning system.

Ms. Moore stated that the lease states SFRTA is responsible for maintaining the air conditioning system. SFRTA will negotiate and be aggressive with the landlord on any design verses maintenance issues.

Board Member Jim Cummings moved for approval. The motion was seconded by Board Member Frank Frione.

The Chair called for further discussion and/or opposition to the motion. Upon hearing none, the Chair declared the motion carried unanimously.

Mr. William Cross, Director of Planning and Capital Development, SFRTA, addressed the Board. Mr. Cross gave a detailed PowerPoint presentation update on the progress of the project.

Board discussion took place.

Ms. Moore clarified that the final agreement will be all-inclusive.

The Chair stated that a resolution will be presented. He directed that a clear understanding be made to the Broward MPO to not include the system wide improvements.

I-2. PRESENTATION – SFRTA Administrative Facility

Ms. Loraine Cargill, Planning Manager, SFRTA, addressed the Board. Ms. Cargill gave a PowerPoint presentation with potential sites for the new administrative facility. Two sites, Pompano Beach and Cypress Creek, are being considered due to the fact that the SFRTA already owns the property.

Board discussion took place.

Board Member Scott commented that if the SFRTA is to explore other areas, to do it quickly.

Board Member Inamdar suggested reaching out and calling the Metropolitan Planning Organizations, Regional Planning Councils and other organizations to share occupancy in the building and to find out their space requirements. He also suggested that there may be a better use for the Cypress Creek property.

The Chair stated that private development or transit oriented development may be the best use for the Cypress Creek property for a revenue stream.

Mayor Jacobs stated that the Cypress Creek location is convenient to the City of Ft. Lauderdale, I-95 and that the uptown area is seeing growth. She commented that the City of Oakland Park owns a parcel in the area and suggested talking with the cities to understand the growth occurring in that area.

Board Member Cummings stated that the idea is to own the building and suggested that SFRTA engage a current engineering/contractor to do a study/survey for SFRTA facility needs.

REQUESTED ACTION:

MOTION TO APPROVE: South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) Resolution # 13-03 supporting the Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) request to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) for the Tri-Rail Coastal Link (TRCL) Service to enter the "Project Development" phase.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:

The purpose of this agenda item is to request approval of a resolution of support to move the TRCL project into the Project Development phase, which is consistent with FTA guidelines and the previously executed multi-party Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for TRCL Service. Specifically, the resolution supports a joint FDOT/SFRTA letter of request to the FTA (on behalf of the Southeast Florida region and the TRCL Partnership) for the TRCL project to enter into the Project Development phase.

The resolution also encourages Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) actions to support TRCL's advancement into the Project Development phase. Such MPO action is consistent with FTA guidelines and the previously approved multi-party Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for TRCL Service. TRCL resolutions seeking concurrence to enter the Project Development phase are being presented to the Broward, Miami-Dade, and Palm Beach MPOs, as well as SFRTA's Governing Board and Planning Technical Advisory Committee (PTAC) during the months of November and December.

An interagency MOU for the TRCL project was executed in May 2013 between FDOT, SFRTA, the region's three MPOs and the South Florida and Treasure Coast Regional Planning Councils (RPCs). As a result of strong public and stakeholder interest in the project, momentum for the TRCL service continues to grow.

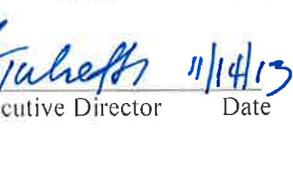
SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND: (Continued)

Discussions are ongoing with Florida East Coast Industries (FECI), which is the parent company of All Aboard Florida (AAF), regarding access to its rail corridor.

The accompanying resolution requests concurrence from the region's three MPOs and the SFRTA for FDOT to commence a two-year Project Development phase under FTA guidelines. During the Project Development phase, the Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA) will be refined and proposed for inclusion in each MPO's Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). A financial plan will also be developed in cooperation with the regional agencies, local governments, and stakeholders.

**RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF
TRANSPORTATION'S REQUEST, ON BEHALF OF THE SOUTHEAST
FLORIDA REGION, TO THE FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION FOR
THE TRI-RAIL COASTAL LINK SERVICE TO ENTER INTO THE
PROJECT DEVELOPMENT PHASE**

WHEREAS, The South Florida Regional Transportation Authority was created with a vision to provide greater mobility in South Florida, thereby improving the economic viability and quality of life of the community, region and state, and a mission to coordinate, develop and implement a viable regional transportation system in South Florida that endeavors to meet the desires and needs for the movement of people, goods and services; and

WHEREAS, future population growth is expected to outpace highway system expansion, which will dramatically worsen congestion levels and travel times within Southeast Florida; and

WHEREAS, benefits of public transportation include reduced travel time, reduced congestion, enhanced safety, improved access for workers, lower transportation costs, lower business costs, lower cost of living, increased business productivity, and economic growth; and

WHEREAS, investment in public transportation has been found to create more jobs than other commonly recommended economic sectors and strategies; and

WHEREAS, there is a critical need to develop adequate transit services to provide enhanced mobility for South Florida's residents and visitors along a major corridor of regional significance; and

WHEREAS, the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) operates the Tri-Rail commuter rail service in Miami, Broward, and Palm Beach counties on the South Florida Rail Corridor and wishes to expand commuter rail operations to the Florida East Coast (FEC) right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, the FEC rail corridor represents an important and strategic transportation corridor that currently provides vital freight rail service to and from Southeast Florida; and

WHEREAS, cities and towns along the FEC rail corridor have been updating their land use, zoning, comprehensive plans, and redevelopment plans in support of future transit services and passenger rail stations; and

WHEREAS, since 2005, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has examined various transit alternatives, alignments, and technologies along an 85-mile portion of the FEC rail corridor from Jupiter to Miami in an effort to establish new rapid transit services; and

WHEREAS, the Florida East Coast Industries, Inc. (FECI) is expected to implement, in 2015, All Aboard Florida (AAF), a new inter-city rail passenger service between Miami and Orlando with intermediate stops in Fort Lauderdale and West Palm Beach; and

WHEREAS, eight parties involved in transportation planning in the Southeast Florida region have entered into the Tri-Rail Coastal Link Memorandum of Understanding dated _____ (MOU) that establishes the framework for the development and implementation of a Tri-Rail Coastal Link Service operated

by SFRTA on the FEC rail corridor; and

WHEREAS, the eight parties to the MOU are FDOT, SFRTA, Miami-Dade MPO, Broward MPO, Palm Beach MPO, Southeast Florida Transportation Council, and the South Florida and Treasure Coast Regional Planning Councils (the “Tri-Rail Coastal Link Partnership”); and

WHEREAS, the MOU delineates the roles and responsibilities of the partners with respect to project development and implementation; and

WHEREAS, negotiations with representatives of the FEC rail corridor have begun in accordance with the MOU to provide access and inclusion of Tri-Rail Coastal Link service within the FEC rail corridor; and

WHEREAS, the Tri-Rail Coastal Link Service MOU requires the project obtain concurrence from the Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach MPOs at major project milestones; and

WHEREAS, consistent with the Tri-Rail Coastal Link MOU, SFRTA, in conjunction with FDOT and the region’s MPOs, will transmit a joint letter to FTA requesting entry into the Project Development phase and indicating that SFRTA will be the future FTA Project Sponsor; and

WHEREAS, through these efforts a fully integrated, coordinated, and complementary system of expanded Tri-Rail services will be provided for existing and future travel markets along the densely developed FEC corridor;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE SOUTH FLORIDA REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY THAT:

SECTION 1. **RECITALS.** The recitals contained in the preamble to this Resolution are incorporated by reference herein.

SECTION 2. SFRTA supports a joint FDOT/SFRTA letter of request to FTA, on behalf of the Southeast Florida region and the Tri-Rail Coastal Link Partnership, for the Tri-Rail Coastal Link to enter into the Project Development phase.

SECTION 3. SFRTA urges the Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach MPO Governing Boards to support the Tri-Rail Coastal Link’s advancement into the Project Development phase.

SECTION 4. FDOT will complete the Project Development effort within two (2) years, consistent with federal guidelines under MAP-21.

SECTION 5. At the conclusion of the Project Development phase, FDOT will obtain concurrence from the Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach MPO Governing Boards for a Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA), which will include details as to project financing per the MOU.

SECTION 6. **SEVERABILITY.**

If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Resolution is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court or competent jurisdiction, then said holding shall in no way affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Resolution shall become effective upon its adoption, and any provision of any previous resolutions in conflict with the provisions herein are hereby superseded.

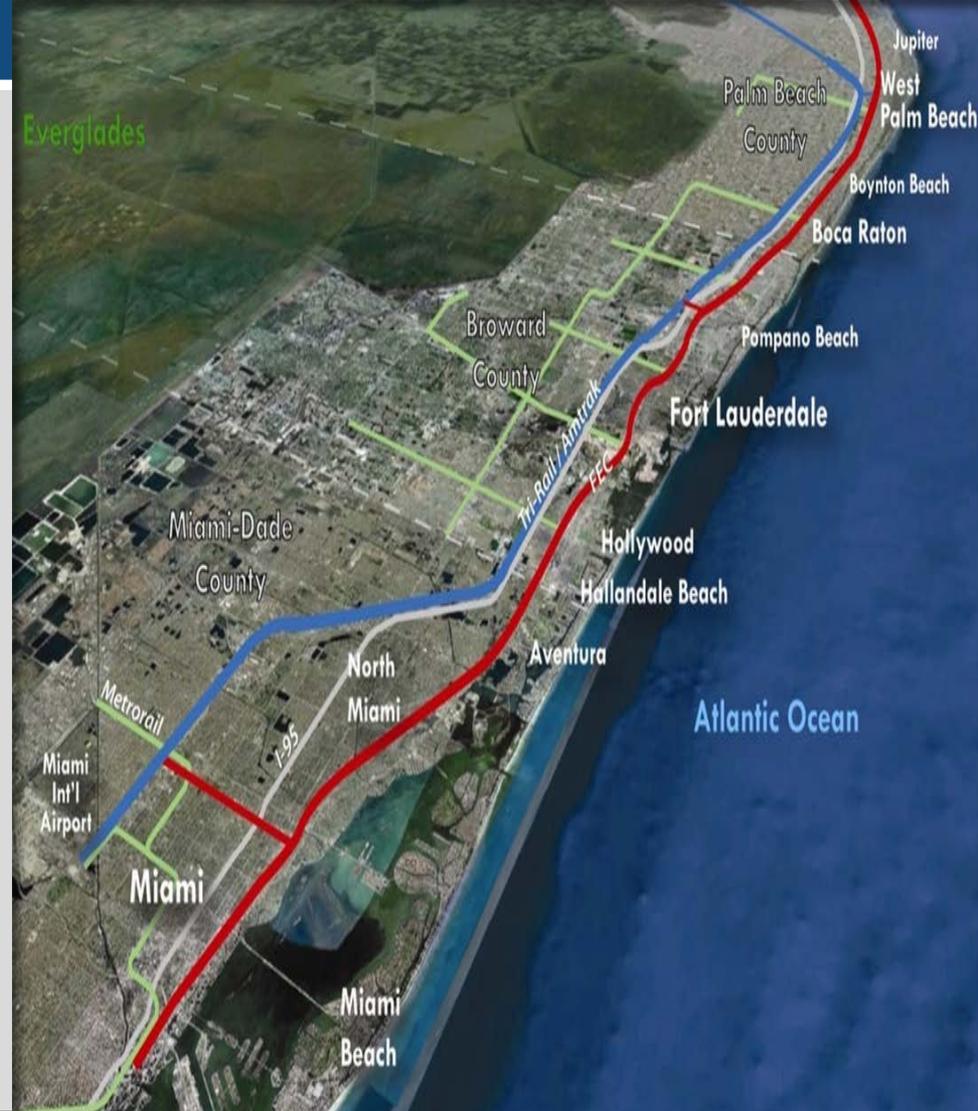

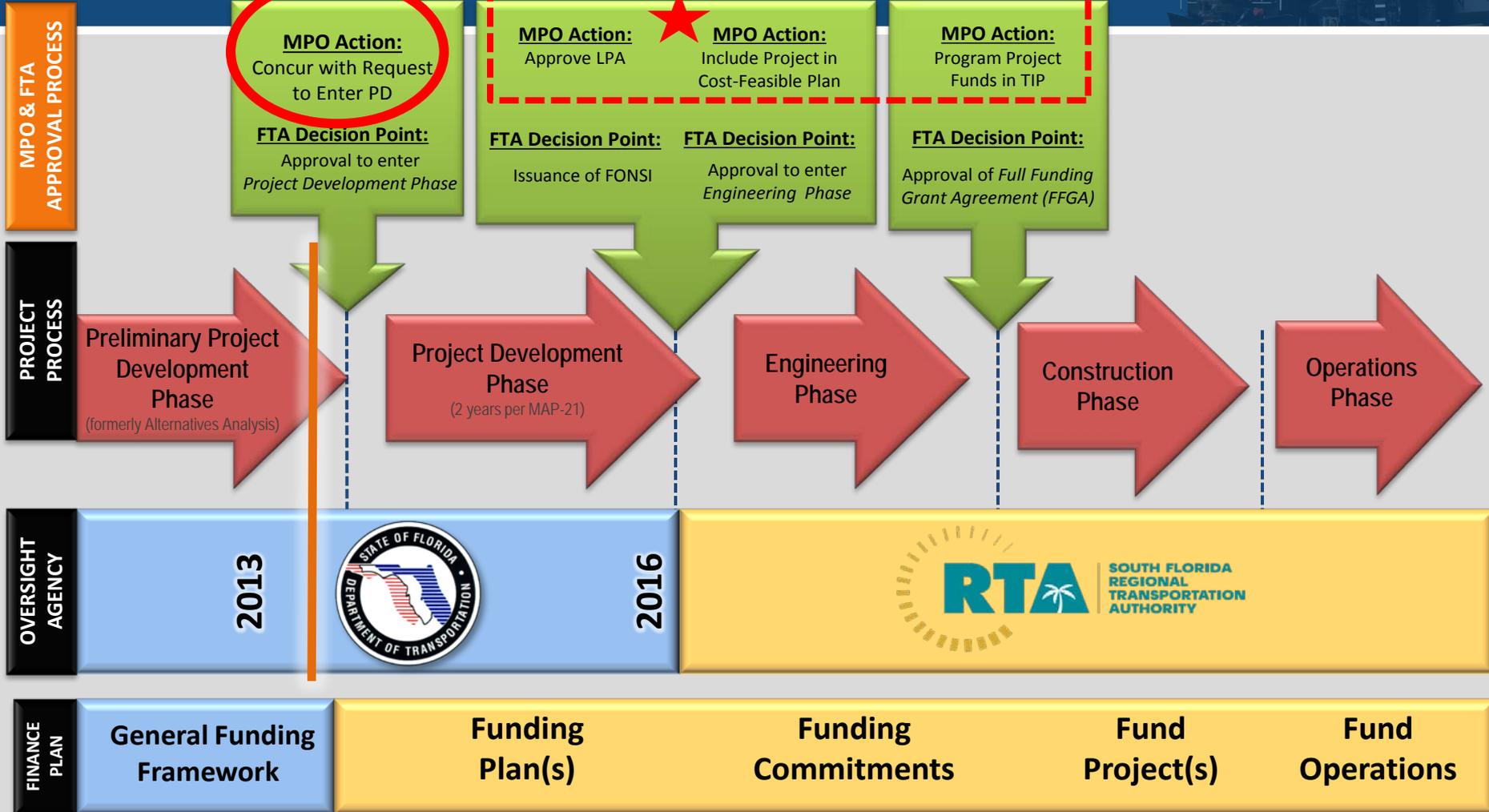

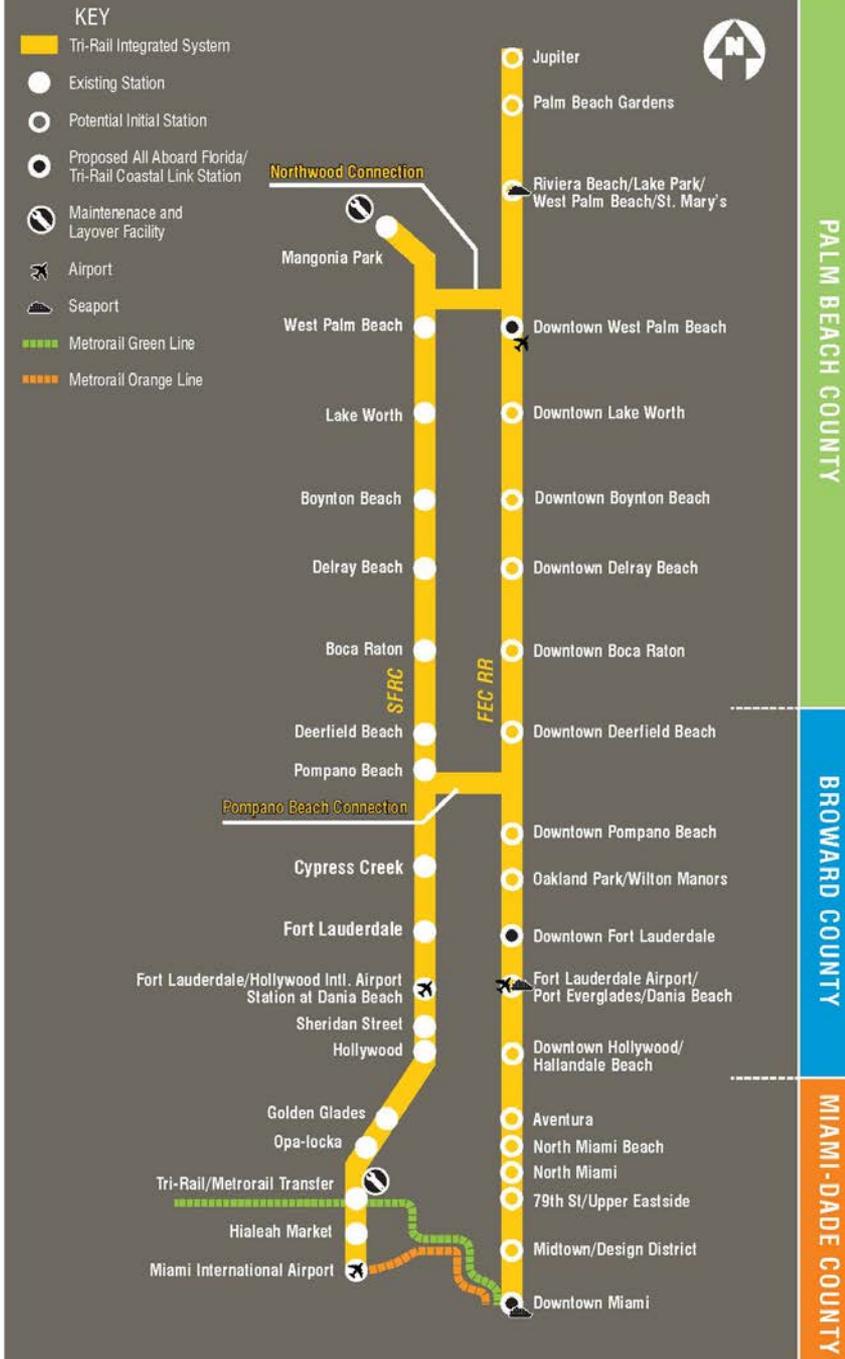

REQUESTED ACTION:

MOTION TO APPROVE: A one year funding agreement between South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) and City of West Palm Beach to fund east-side parking lot improvements and other activities on the east side of the West Palm Beach Intermodal Station, in the amount of \$686,108.50.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:

For many years, the SFRTA, its predecessor, and other partners worked together to develop an intermodal transportation center adjacent to the West Palm Beach Tri-Rail Station. This vision was realized in 2009, when the West Palm Beach Intermodal Center (on the west side of the station) was completed. The new intermodal center has multiple elements, including 18 bus bays for Palm Tran service and a new park-and-ride lot consisting of 163 parking spaces for Tri-Rail patrons, other transit users, and transit agency employees. Ridership levels at the West Palm Beach station have continued to grow since the completion of these west side improvements.

In recent years, SFRTA has also worked with the City of West Palm Beach to identify a number of potential improvements on the east side of the West Palm Beach Tri-Rail Station. (The City owns the station building and land on the east side.) Budgetary constraints have limited the City's ability to fully implement the wide array of improvements that have been sought. However, the City has been able to complete some east side improvements, such as circulation redesign and pedestrian upgrades, through their Transportation Enhancement program in 2012. SFRTA previously assisted the City by filling a funding shortfall for its east side Transportation Enhancement program by providing some funds from a federal grant awarded to the SFRTA for the West Palm Beach station.

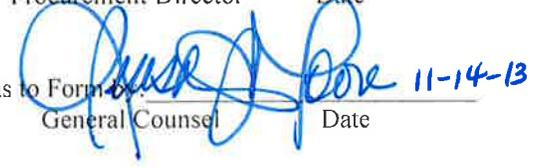
SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND: (Continued)

A balance of \$686,108.50 currently remains in this grant that must be spent at the West Palm Beach Station. SFRTA and City staff have worked together to identify appropriate east side station upgrades that would meet the requirements of the federal grant and utilize the remaining balance. The station upgrades to be completed are the milling and resurfacing of the east side parking areas, enhanced lighting (on both the east side parking areas and platform, using energy efficient and cost saving LED technology), and new landscaping, hardscape, and furnishings.

The City, through its contractor, will construct the station improvements over the next 12 months. SFRTA shall reimburse the City for the east side station improvements in the maximum amount of \$686,119 (the remaining amount of federal grant funds).

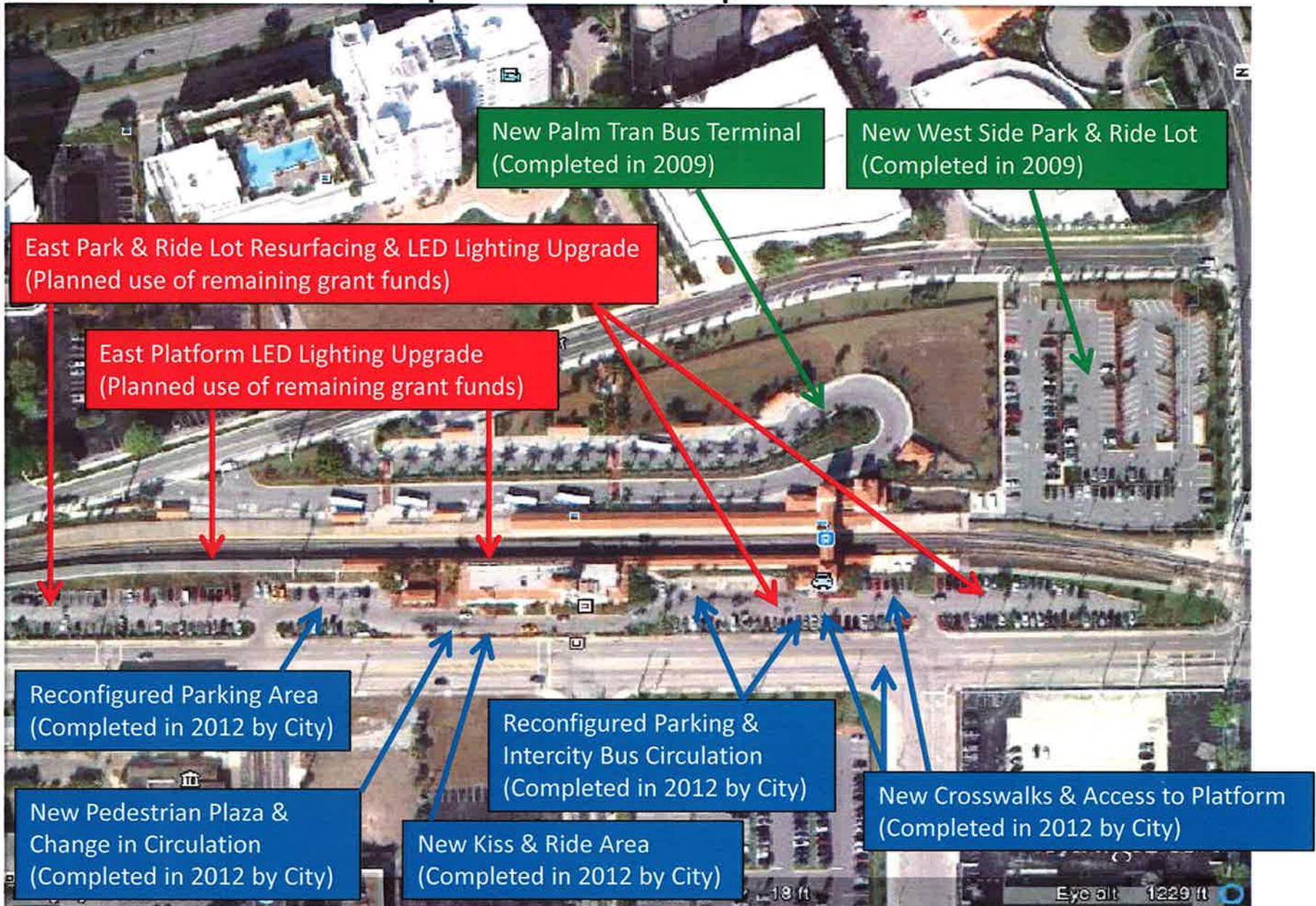

AND OTHER ACTIVITIES
AT THE WEST PALM BEACH INTERMODAL STATION

THIS FUNDING AGREEMENT is made and entered into this ___ day of _____, 2013, by and between the SOUTH FLORIDA REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY, a body politic and corporate, an agency of the State of Florida, its successors and assignees, (hereinafter referred to as “**SFRTA**”) and the CITY OF WEST PALM BEACH, a Florida municipality, (hereinafter referred to as “**CITY**”).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, SFRTA operates a commuter rail service on the South Florida Rail Corridor commonly known as “Tri-Rail”; and

WHEREAS, CITY and **SFRTA** have entered into a Triple Net Lease Agreement (the “Lease Agreement”) dated February 27, 2004, that grants **SFRTA** the non-exclusive right to use **CITY**’s real property for a public parking lot for Tri-Rail passengers at the West Palm Beach Intermodal Station (the “East Parking Lot”), as well as areas within the Intermodal Station for a Ticket Window and passenger waiting area (which are no longer used by **SFRTA**); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Lease Agreement and, independently, pursuant to **SFRTA**’s Segment 5 Double-Track Improvement Program, **SFRTA** has made a substantial investment in improvements to the platforms at the Intermodal Station, including construction of an elevated pedestrian walkway to enhance the use of the Intermodal Station for commuter rail service; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Transit Administration (“FTA”) has awarded a grant to **SFRTA** (FL-04-0039) to provide funding for parking improvements at the West Palm Beach Intermodal Station; and

WHEREAS, a portion of the grant funds have been used to construct a new public parking lot on real property owned by Palm Beach County on the west side of the Intermodal Station for the non-exclusive use of Tri-Rail passengers; and

WHEREAS, SFRTA wishes to continue to invest in enhancements to the West Palm Beach Intermodal Station that will benefit the growth of regional transportation and has offered to fund improvements and other activities proposed by the **CITY** for the East Parking Lot and Intermodal Station; and

WHEREAS, SFRTA and CITY desire to enter into this agreement for the purposes of defining the parties' funding obligations as well as other responsibilities and the parties' expectations and roles in the construction of a parking lot improvements to serve the West Palm Beach Intermodal Station:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual terms and conditions, promises, covenants and payments hereinafter set forth, **SFRTA and CITY** agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 – SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED BY CITY

1.1 Scope of Services. **CITY**, through its contractor, will construct the parking lot improvements and shall undertake the additional improvements and activities described in the summary table, which is attached to and made a part of this Agreement as Attachment "A." Those activities include, but are not limited to, a schematic design for improvements to the interior of the Intermodal Station, which would allow the station interior to serve as a joint passenger waiting area for passengers from Amtrak, Greyhound and Tri-Rail. **CITY** agrees that it will use its best efforts in the future, subject to the availability of funds and subject to the approval of Greyhound and Amtrak, to construct the interior improvements and provide a passenger waiting area for Tri-Rail passengers.

1.2 In the event, **CITY's** contractor(s) submits any change orders or changes to the work in connection with the Project, the **CITY's** Project Manager will review the change with **SFRTA's** Project Manager before the change order or change in work is processed for approval. Any increases or decreases in the Contract Amount, as set forth in Paragraph 3.1 below, that is approved in the change order or change in work shall be reflected in the Contract Amount due the **CITY**.

1.3 **CITY** shall cooperate with **SFRTA** in providing all documentation required for reporting on Project activities to the FTA and in satisfying any other Federal grant requirements in connection with FL-04-0039.

ARTICLE 2 – TERM OF AGREEMENT

2.1 This Agreement shall become effective upon execution by the parties. The term of this Agreement shall be for one (1) year from the effective date or until **SFRTA's** payment to **CITY** is made as provided for in Article 3, whichever occurs first.

ARTICLE 3 - COMPENSATION

3.1 **SFRTA** shall reimburse **CITY** for the final cost of the Project in the maximum amount of \$686,108.50 (the "Contract Amount") from FTA grant funds. Payment shall be made within thirty (30) days of **SFRTA's** receipt of **CITY's** invoice for the Contract Amount, along with documents, acceptable to **SFRTA**, evidencing the **CITY's** acceptance of all work covered by the

invoice. **SFRTA** shall have no funding obligation for the Project beyond the amount of available FTA grant funds.

ARTICLE 4 – PROJECT COORDINATION AND RESPONSIBILITIES

4.1 **CITY** shall be responsible for the delivery and coordination of the Project.

4.2 **SFRTA**'s Project Manager for this Agreement shall be the Director of Planning, Engineering and Construction for **SFRTA** or other authorized representative. **CITY**'s Project Manager shall be

ARTICLE 5 – MISCELLANEOUS

5.1 How Agreement Is Affected by Provisions Being Held Invalid. If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected. In such an instance the remainder would continue and be conformed to the terms and requirements of applicable law; provided, however, that if **SFRTA**'s funding obligation or any other provision of this Agreement is found to be invalid which would cause there to be a lack of mutuality of obligation or remedy, then this Agreement shall terminate. Nothing contained herein shall cause **SFRTA** to be relieved of its obligation to compensate **CITY** for services rendered.

5.2 Bonus or Commission. By execution of the Agreement, **CITY** represents that it has not paid and also agrees not to pay any bonus or commission for the purpose of obtaining an approval of any application for financing hereunder.

5.3 State of Territorial Law. Nothing in the Agreement shall require **CITY** to observe or enforce compliance with any provision thereof, perform any other act or do any other thing in contravention of any applicable State law. If **CITY** believes any of the provisions of the Agreement violates any applicable State law, **CITY** will at once notify **SFRTA** in writing in order that appropriate changes and modifications may be made so as to enable **SFRTA** and **CITY** to proceed as soon as possible with the project.

5.4 Contractual Indemnity. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed as a waiver of either parties' sovereign immunity as set forth in Section 768.28, F.S. This Agreement is not intended to be a third party beneficiary contract and confers no rights on anyone other than the **SFRTA** or **CITY**. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to constitute an imposition or acceptance of any obligation or liability, by either party, not otherwise imposed by the express and unequivocal language of this Agreement.

5.5 Restrictions on Lobbying.

Federal: **CITY** agrees that no federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid by or on behalf of **SFRTA** to any person for influencing or attempting to influence any officer or employee of any federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any federal contract, the making of any federal grant, the making of any federal loan, the entering into of any

cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement.

If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid by **CITY** to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.

CITY will require that the language of this section be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

State: No funds received pursuant to this Agreement may be expended for lobbying the Legislature or a state agency.

ARTICLE 6 - TERMINATION

6.1 If, through any cause within the reasonable control of **CITY**, **CITY** shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner, or otherwise violate any of the covenants, agreements, or stipulations which are material to this Agreement, **SFRTA** may thereupon give written notice to **CITY** of such default and specify what actions must be taken to cure said default and avoid termination hereunder. **CITY** shall have forty-five (45) days to cure said default or such additional period authorized by **SFRTA**. In the event that **CITY** shall not have cured said default to the satisfaction of **SFRTA** by such deadline, then this Agreement may be terminated by **SFRTA** upon notice of termination to **CITY**.

6.2 If, through any cause within the reasonable control of **SFRTA**, **SFRTA** shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner, or otherwise violate any of the covenants, agreements, or stipulations which are material to this Agreement, **CITY** may thereupon give written notice to **SFRTA** of such default and specify what actions must be taken to cure said default and avoid termination hereunder. **SFRTA** shall have forty-five (45) days to cure or additional period authorized by **CITY**. In the event that **SFRTA** shall not have cured said default by such deadline, then this Agreement may be terminated by **CITY** upon notice of termination to **SFRTA**.

ARTICLE 7 – CHANGES AND MODIFICATIONS

7.1 Upon the execution and delivery of this Agreement, it is understood and agreed that, except for the Lease Agreement, any and all previous agreements and understandings, both written and oral, between the parties are cancelled and have been superseded by this Agreement and that this Agreement embodies and sets forth all understandings between the parties.

7.2 Modifications to this Agreement must be made in the form of a written amendment signed by **SFRTA** and **CITY**.

ARTICLE 8 - NOTICES

8.1 Whenever either party desires to give notice to the other, it must be given by written notice, sent by certified U.S. mail, with return receipt requested, or other commonly accepted document carrier, addressed to the party for whom it is intended, at the place last specified, and the place for giving of notice shall remain such until it shall have been changed by written notice in compliance with the provisions of this paragraph. For the present, the parties designate the following as the respective places for giving of notice:

ARTICLE 9 – STATE LAW AND VENUE

9.1 This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted according to the laws of the State of Florida and venue with respect to any litigation shall be Palm Beach County, Florida, whether in state or federal court. The parties agree that each will submit to the jurisdiction of the Florida state or federal court in any action or proceeding arising out of or related to this Agreement and agree that all claims in respect to such action or proceeding may be heard and determined in Palm Beach County, Florida, the venue situs.

ARTICLE 10 – FORCE MAJEURE

10.1 In the event the performance by **CITY** of any of its obligations or undertakings hereunder shall be interrupted or delayed by any occurrence, whether such occurrence be an act of God, common enemy or the result of war, labor unrest or dispute, riot, civil commotion or sovereign conduct, or any other act or event which **CITY** reasonably determines will interfere with its ability to perform, **CITY** shall be excused from performance for such period of time as is reasonably necessary after the occurrence to remedy the effects thereof.

ARTICLE 11 – SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

11.1 Subject to other provisions hereof, Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of the parties to the Agreement.

ARTICLE 12 – JOINT PREPARATION

12.1 The preparation of this Agreement has been a joint effort of the parties, and the resulting document shall not be construed more severely against one of the parties than the other.

ARTICLE 13 – CAPTIONS

13.1 The captions and section designations herein set forth are for convenience only and shall have no substantive meaning.

TRI-RAIL COASTAL LINK ON THE FEC CORRIDOR

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:

Since late 2011, South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) has worked with its partner agencies on plans to expand Tri-Rail service onto the Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway corridor in an accelerated manner. Now known as the “Tri-Rail Coastal Link” (TRCL), a regional partnership is pursuing an aggressive development schedule that would create significant new economic development opportunities, and offer an important new mobility option that would integrate with the existing Tri-Rail system to provide a one-seat ride between the region’s major downtowns.

At the September 28, 2012 SFRTA Governing Board meeting, the Chair stated that Tri-Rail expansion onto the FEC was a top priority and requested that frequent updates be provided to the Governing Board. As a result, a TRCL project update is now provided by SFRTA staff at every Governing Board meeting. These regular updates include information on various TRCL elements, including overall project information and details related to SFRTA’s key roles that were identified in the project’s Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The MOU was unanimously approved by the Broward, Miami-Dade and Palm Beach Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPOs), South Florida Regional Planning Council (SFRPC), Treasure Coast Regional Planning Council (TCRPC), Southeast Florida Transportation Council (SEFTC); and SFRTA Governing Board; and signed by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) in May 2013.

Numerous activities related to the TRCL project has occurred since the last Governing Board meeting on October 25, 2013. On-going meetings of the TRCL Executive Steering Committee and Sub-Committees have taken place, as well as other coordination meetings between representatives of Florida East Coast Industries (FECI), FDOT, and SFRTA.

Public Involvement/Outreach Sub-committee:

The Public Involvement/Outreach Sub-Committee is responsible for public outreach activities as the TRCL moves forward. Topics discussed at recent meetings include review of a draft TRCL website (now “LIVE”), formulation of a draft resolution of support to enter the next “project development” phase, development of a schedule of meetings and presentations to partner agency committees and governing boards later this year, and an upcoming outreach and communications plan.

Financial Sub-Committee:

The Financial Sub-Committee is responsible for the development of a financial and funding plan for the TRCL Project, including local contributions. The project team is currently performing a detailed analysis of funding options and strategies to support both capital and operating costs, some of which may require legislative action. An update on these potential funding options and strategies will continue to be provided as part of the TRCL staff presentations to the SFRTA Governing Board. On October 31 and November 1, 2013, “one on one” meetings were held with MPO Executive Directors to discuss finance issues and obtain input and direction on the potential funding options and strategies.

Technical Sub-Committee:

The Technical Sub-Committee is responsible for all technical activities in support of the TRCL project. Recent progress of the Technical Sub-Committee includes development of an updated capital and O&M costs, and continued operational and travel demand analyses.

The Technical Sub-Committee has also been utilized as a forum to summarize the various ongoing coordination efforts associated with FECI’s All Aboard Florida (AAF) intercity passenger rail project. The AAF/Tri-Rail Coastal Link coordination includes workgroups focusing on four key areas: Stations (at the shared downtown Miami, Fort Lauderdale, and West Palm Beach locations); Structures (infrastructure needs for both projects); Operations (operational details for freight, inter-city, and commuter rail services); and Vehicle Layover/Maintenance Facilities (potential shared use of such facilities, particularly the Hialeah Yard). The Operations workgroup has continued to have conference calls on a regular basis, while the Vehicle Layover/Maintenance workgroup continues to refine concepts for additional passenger rail utilization of the SFRC Hialeah Yard.

FDOT, SFRTA staff and consultants also had a detailed technical coordination meeting on October 30, 2013. Topics discussed included station layouts, bridge and structures concepts, and operating scenarios. Significant progress was made and a possible solution for the downtown Fort Lauderdale station was identified for further testing, analysis and coordination.

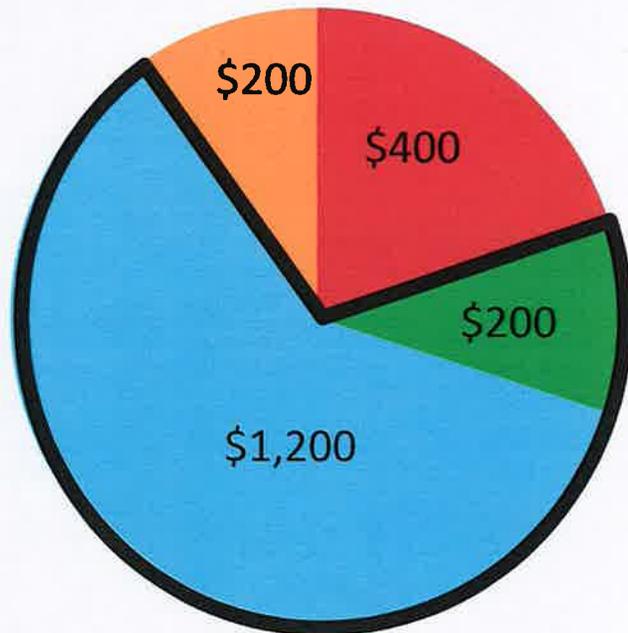

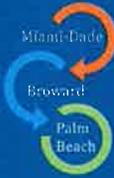

Rental Car Surcharge Plus Station Assessment Fee



- Rental Car Surcharge of \$2 to \$3 per day for rental cars in three county region
 - The industry will likely ask that the fee be consistent in the region to eliminate competitive issues among the region
 - Does not lend itself to an allocation of cost by geographical area
 - Requires State legislation for a regional Rental Car Surcharge
- Station Assessment Fee
 - Assessed to both existing Tri-Rail and TRCL stations
 - Fee can vary with existing stations being lower rates and new stations being higher rates
 - Rate will be assessed to the Cities with stations and the County where the Station is not in a City boundary

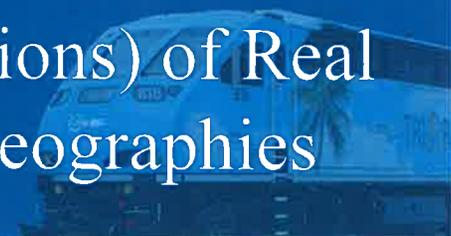

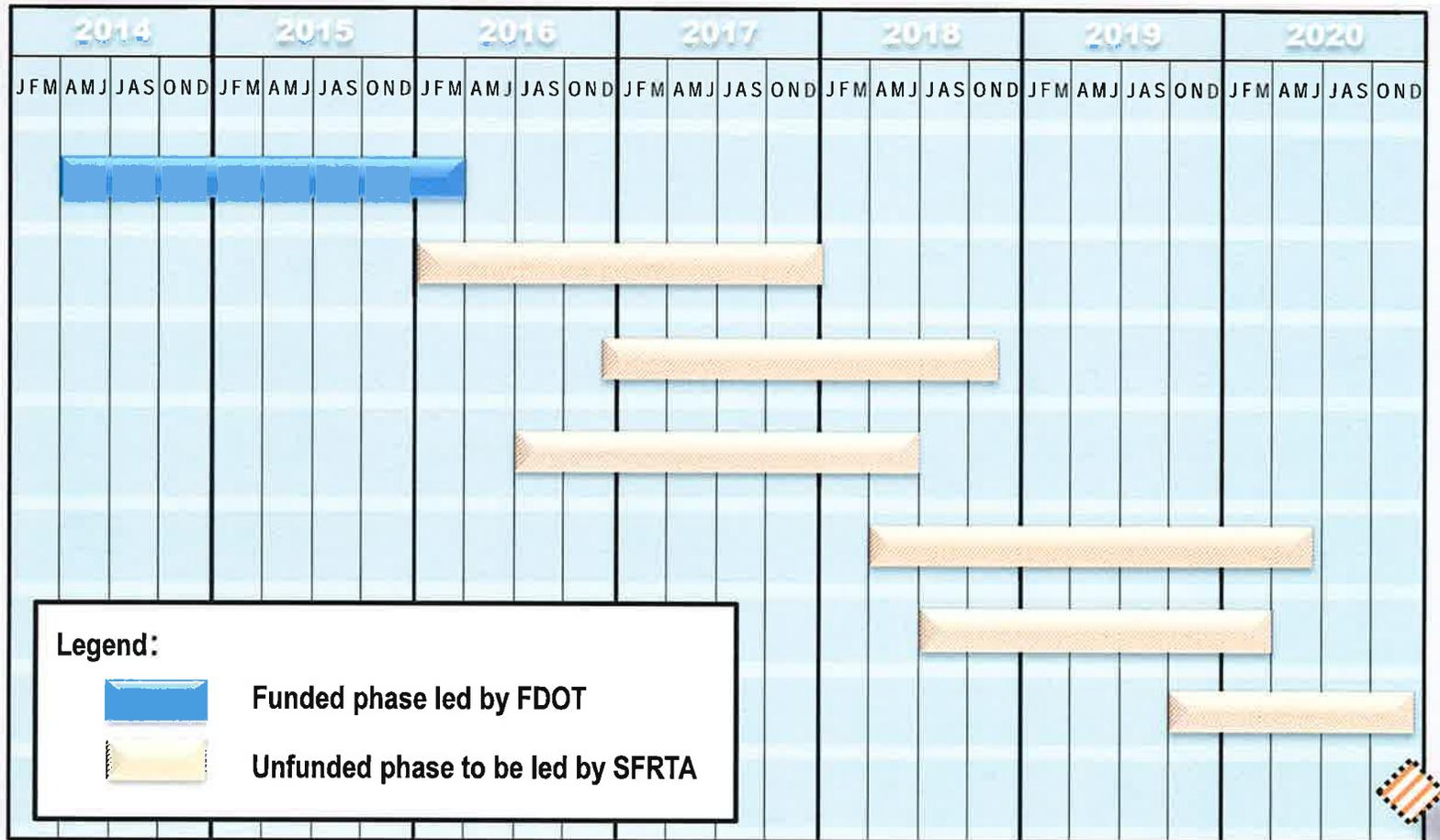

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:

At the October 25, 2013 South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) Governing Board meeting, staff presented a brief analysis of the pros and cons of the Cypress Creek and Pompano Beach Tri-Rail Station sites to accommodate a new SFRTA Administrative Facility.

Following that presentation, the Board requested staff to: 1) explore the office space requirements of the Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and the South Florida Regional Planning Council (SFRPC); 2) contact the City of Fort Lauderdale and the City of Oakland Park to find out their plans for the Cypress Creek area; and 3) utilize a consultant to estimate the office space requirements for SFRTA.

Staff has confirmed that the Broward MPO would require approximately 10,000 square feet of office space, while the SFRPC would require about 5,000 square feet. Both agencies have also confirmed that they would consider co-locating in a facility if it was built at Cypress Creek, however a building at Pompano Beach may not provide an option for co-locating as it is further north of their service area.

Staff is currently reaching out to the City of Fort Lauderdale and the City of Oakland Park regarding their plans for the Cypress Creek area. An update will be provided to the Board at the November Board Meeting.

Staff has initiated work with one of its general planning consultants to perform an Operational Needs Analysis to determine the Agency's space requirements over both the short and long term. This study is underway and will be brought back to the January Governing Board Meeting.

SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:

Seven50 (“seven counties, 50 years”) is a blueprint for growing a more prosperous, more desirable Southeast Florida during the next 50 years and beyond. The plan is being developed to help ensure a vibrant and resilient economy, and stewardship of the fragile ecosystem in what is quickly becoming one of the world’s most important mega-regions.

Spearheaded by the South Florida and Treasure Coast Regional Planning Councils (RPCs) and the Southeast Florida Regional Partnership (SFRP), a unique collaboration of more than 200 public, private, and civic stakeholders, Seven50 is mapping the strategy for the best possible quality of life for the more than six million residents of Monroe, Miami-Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, Martin, St. Lucie and Indian River counties.

A draft plan has been prepared with the input gained through a series of public summits, workshops, online outreach and high-impact studies led by the region’s top thinkers.

Seven50 would like to present the draft plan to the SFRTA Board, one of its consortium members. A final plan is to be completed by December 28, 2013. The final of four summits is planned for January 15, 2014 at the Broward County Convention Center.

Seven50 has been made possible by a grant from the US Department of Housing & Urban Development’s Sustainable Communities Initiative.

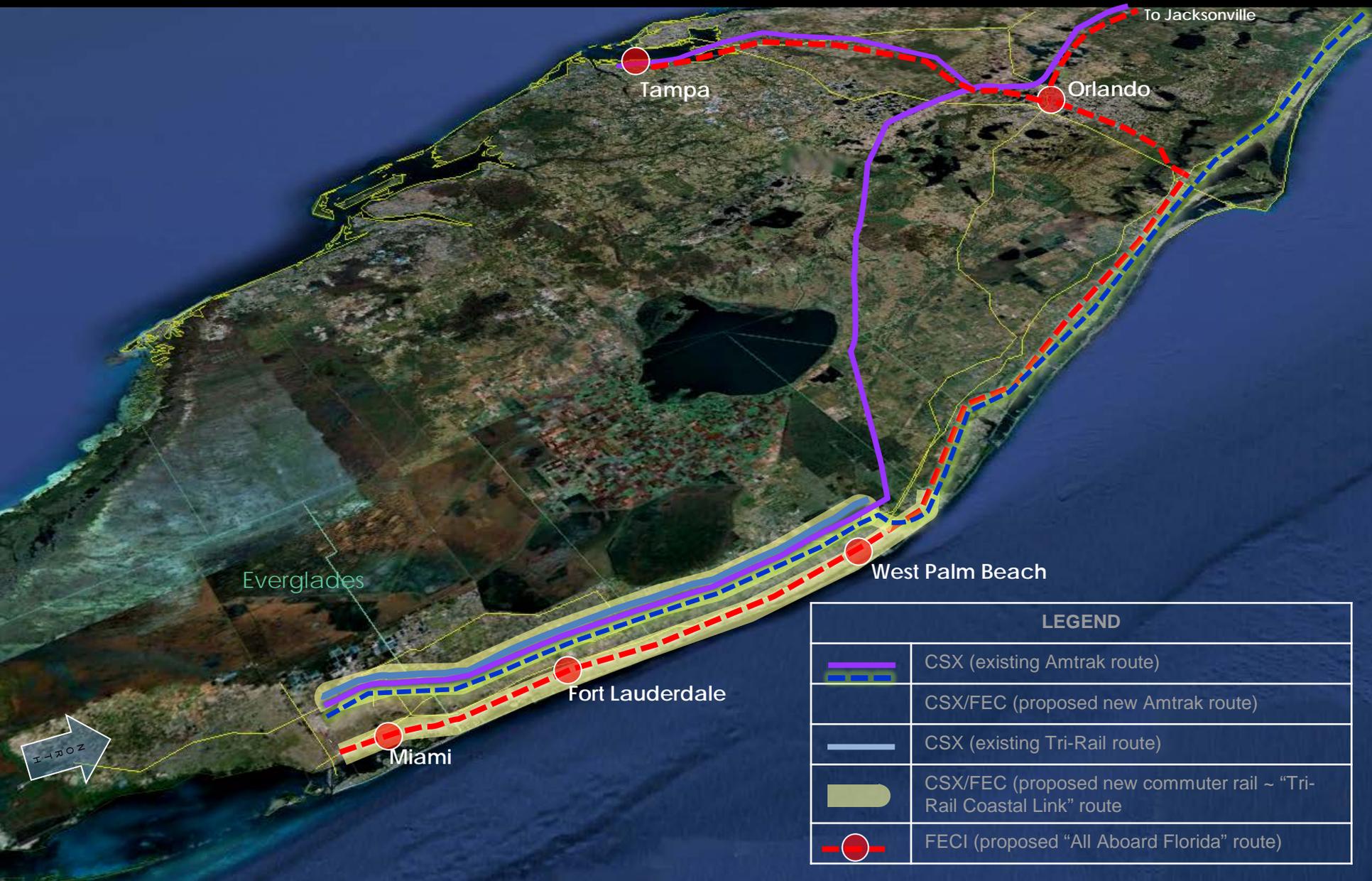


Anticipated Future Roadway Deficiencies

The Chair called the meeting to order at 10:42 a.m.

C1 – MOTION TO APPROVE: Minutes of Planning Technical Advisory Committee Meeting of July 22, 2013

Mr. Jeff Weidner made a motion to approve the meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Jonathan Roberson. The motion was called to a vote and carried unanimously.

REGULAR AGENDA

II. - INFORMATION: Miami River-Miami Intermodal Center Capacity Improvement (MR-MICCI)

Ms. Loraine Cargill of SFRTA introduced this item and gave the first part of the presentation. Ms. Cargill stated that we are in the Phase 2 of the project study, which kicked off in September 2012 and is scheduled to end in late 2014. She noted that the MR-MICCI study area is a 1.25 mile segment of the South Florida Rail Corridor from just north of the Hialeah Market Tri-Rail Station to the Miami Intermodal Center (MIC). Ms. Cargill mentioned that the Miami River is a key issue, as currently a single track historic bridge serves as the SFRC’s crossing over the river. She added that MR-MICCI Phase 2 has a PD&E focus but will have 30% design plans at its conclusion. The PD&E work will evaluate multiple alternatives for bridge crossings and the number of tracks. The presentation to PTAC is part of an outreach effort throughout the fall, which includes an update to the SFRTA Governing Board in late September and a public workshop to be held on Nov 6 at the MDX offices.

Project consultants John Lafferty with Parsons Brinckerhoff and Greg Kyle with Kimley-Horn continued the presentation, providing further project details and findings to date. Mr. Kyle explained that the historic rail bridge was constructed in the 1920's and rehabilitated in the 1990's. He noted that the project has gone through the ETDM process and programming screen, adding that an environmental assessment (EA) is the anticipated class of action. Mr. Lafferty stated that river navigation is another key issue for the project. He said that fixed and movable bridge options are under consideration, and that coordination has occurred with the Coast Guard and Army Corps of Engineers. Mr. Lafferty explained that the study team is recommending elimination of the 4 track bridge options. It was also noted that some marine uses remain west of the existing rail bridge, with 33 bridge openings occurring over the past year.

Chair Delaney asked about the best case scenario schedule for the project. Ms. Cargill replied that it would be design beginning in FY 2015 and construction occurring in the FY 2016-18 timeframe. Mr. Steinmiller asked about the clearance above the river for the existing rail bridge. Mr. Lafferty replied that the existing bridge allows 8 feet clearance above the Miami River. Mr. Cargill concluded the item by reminding the committee about the public workshop on November 6 and encouraging everyone to visit the project website at www.mrmicci.com for additional details.

12. - INFORMATION: SFRTA Shuttle Bus System Update

Mr. Joseph Quinty gave a brief introduction of the item, stating in recent years, various aspects of SFRTA's Shuttle Bus services have been brought to the PTAC for review, guidance, and endorsement. Mr. Quinty explained that today's presentation is a mid-year update of some changes that have occurred since the PTAC adopted the SFRTA Five Year Shuttle Bus Service and Financial Plan in the Spring. Mr. Stephen Anderson then gave a powerpoint presentation on these SFRTA Shuttle Bus system changes and progress.

Mr. Anderson stated that SFRTA shuttle bus ridership continues to grow, as it typically exceeds 100,000 boardings per month and is on pace to reach a highest ever total of 1.5 million boardings in calendar year 2013. He also shared details on various shuttle expansion efforts that have taken place in recent months. These include additional AM peak service on the SFRTA Fort Lauderdale 1 route and new partnerships with public and private sector entities. Some of the public sector partnerships noted by Mr. Anderson include expanded and enhanced service on the Boca Raton/Arvida Park of Commerce routes, the Delray Beach Downtown Roundabout, the Fort Lauderdale TMA Northwest Community and Neighborhood Link routes, and Opa-Locka North route. Mr. Anderson also provided information on new privately operated shuttle services being provided by St. Thomas University and the Miami Dolphins (for home football games). He also some additional shuttle bus initiatives still in the planning stages, including adjustments to the Fort Lauderdale Route 2 to serve the Art Institute of Fort Lauderdale, extension of the Hollywood CRA trolleys to the Hollywood Tri-Rail station, and Barry University's interest in a privately operated shuttle to/from Tri-Rail.

Mr. Weidner commented on the importance and growing success of circulators, which bodes well for increased streetcar services in the future. Chair Delaney agreed, noting that there is growing interest in West Palm Beach in a streetcar system. Mr. Fred Stubbs suggested improved marketing of the shuttle services to increase awareness. Mr. Weidner suggested wrapping the SFRTA shuttle buses to look like the Tri-Rail trains.

13. - INFORMATION: BCT Connected – The Broward County Transit FY 2014-2023 Transit Development Plan (TDP) Major Update

Mr. Jonathan Roberson of BCT introduced this item and gave the first part of its presentation. Mr. Roberson thanked committee members who had reviewed the final draft BCT TDP document. He noted that the full TDP document was available for review on the BCT website. Ms. Laura Everett of Tindale-Oliver assisted with the presentation, providing a variety of statistics and information.

One key finding that was shared is that BCT's ridership has grown 216% since 1987. An overview of the TDP's outreach activities was given, which noted 58 outreach events were held and that there was a total of 9,000 participants. These included an onboard survey and a 500 person telephone poll. Details of the TDP's contents were shared, as well. Key recommendations are improved bicycle and pedestrian access and accommodations on the system, real-time information, increased service frequencies, and addition of hybrid vehicles. One of the distinctive approaches of the TDP is the inclusion of two plans: a "Status Quo" and "Vision" approach. The Status Quo approach maintains the existing system and adds the Wave Streetcar project, improved Cypress Creek access, Lauderhill Mall facility improvements, bus stop/shelter improvements, and B-Cycle expansion. The Vision approach includes extra elements such as new fixed route services, enhanced bus service on 8 corridors, a new downtown Fort Lauderdale intermodal center, new vehicles, and numerous park-and-ride lots.

Committee questions included clarification of future projected costs and ridership for the Status Quo and Vision approaches. There was also interest expressed in synchronizing the TDP schedules for all four transit providers in the region. Comments included kudos for identifying needs that can be fed into the MPO long range transportation plan (LRTP) process.

14. - INFORMATION: Railroad Crossing Delay and Truck Volume Monitoring

Due to items I1, I2, and I3 running long, there was committee consensus to postpone this item to a later meeting date. November was identified as the likely timeframe.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Mr. Quinty mentioned that the PTAC meetings will continue to be coordinated with the SEFTC Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (RTTAC) and may involve additional rotation of the meeting location between the three counties. There was committee consensus in support of rotating the PTAC meeting location throughout the region.

PTAC MEMBER COMMENTS

Mr. Flavien announced details for the upcoming Performance Measures Workshop being hosted by the Broward MPO. Mr. Weidner also announced the Air Cargo and Sea Cargo event being held in Miami in early November. Chairperson Delaney mentioned details for the Rail~Volution conference being held in October.

ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 12:20 PM.

Pompano Beach Station Improvements:

Upgrade of existing Pompano Beach Station to Segment 5 station standards. Improvements consist of widening existing platforms to 25' width, new full-length canopies, solar paneling, pedestrian overpass with stairs and elevators, bus circulation improvements, and parking lot reconfiguration. The design package will include specifications to obtain, at a minimum, Silver LEED certification. The 100% design plans have been completed, and are being reviewed by SFRTA's procurement for advertisement. The flagging agreement with CSXT has now been finalized, allowing review and approval of plans and scheduling of flagging protection. Estimated construction start is Spring 2014.

Opa-Locka Station Parking Expansion:

Expand parking at Tri-Rail's Opa-Locka Station, inclusive of adding about forty five (45) new parking spaces to the south of the station; increase bus bay areas in the existing parking lot; install a pedestrian canopy over the bus waiting areas with solar panels; and improve landscape and hardscape. A Work Order was executed for HNTB to provide site geotechnical investigation, site survey, environmental services as required for a Categorical Exclusion per NEPA requirements; and the preparation of 30% design plans. Geotechnical investigation, survey, and 30% design plans have been completed. The NEPA documentation has been completed and approved by FDOT and the FTA. SFRTA has executed a work order for the final 100% design plans, permitting and bidding phase assistance for the project. The design kick-off meeting was held on August 21, 2013 and the final 100% design is currently underway. The 75% design plans are expected to be completed by the end of November 2013. Coordination meetings will be scheduled with the City of Opa-Locka to review the proposed design as it progresses.

Wave Modern Streetcar:

Design, Construction and Management of a 2.7 mile modern streetcar in Downtown Fort Lauderdale with passenger, solar powered stations, which will operate in mixed traffic with signal priority. Project includes the procurement of five (5) vehicles and the construction of a storage and maintenance yard. Project Partners include The Federal Transit Administration (FTA), Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), Broward County, Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), City of Fort Lauderdale, Fort Lauderdale Downtown Development Authority (DDA) and SFRTA. An Interlocal Partnership Agreement has been executed by all parties on April 26, 2013. The Project Management Consultant (PMC) contract was awarded to HDR Engineering, Inc. to provide services throughout the project. The NTP was issued on May 9, 2013 for the 1.47-mile starter line (Phase 1A). Additional funds are being applied for to get the resources for the full project length. Preliminary engineering activities have started and are scheduled to continue through the rest of 2013, including a preliminary alignment, utility investigations, survey, geotechnical investigation, design criteria, documents control plan, quality management plan, project schedule, vehicle parameters analysis, and community awareness plan discussions.

Project progress includes survey, geotechnical work, utility investigation, preliminary alignment and station location study, and the bridge inspection at 3rd Avenue. Coordination activities include interaction with all the Project Partners. Other project related activities include final drafts of the Quality Assurance Plan and Document Control Plan. Two workshops were held for streetcar vehicle manufactures to present the latest technologies on their streetcars. Computer-aided Design (CAD) manual and a project schedule (CPM) were also completed. PMC is working on completing the 30% plans by the end of the year, afterwards the project will move into final design.

OCTOBER RIDERSHIP

Total monthly ridership for October has increased 5.0 % when compared to October of last year. Weekday ridership has increased by 1.8 % for October, while the average weekday ridership in October 2012 was 14,936 per day versus 15,203 per day for 2013. Total weekend ridership for the fiscal year has increased by 30.6 % when compared to last year. Total fiscal year ridership is up by 8.3%.

Chart 1 - SFRTA Riders and Revenue Trends

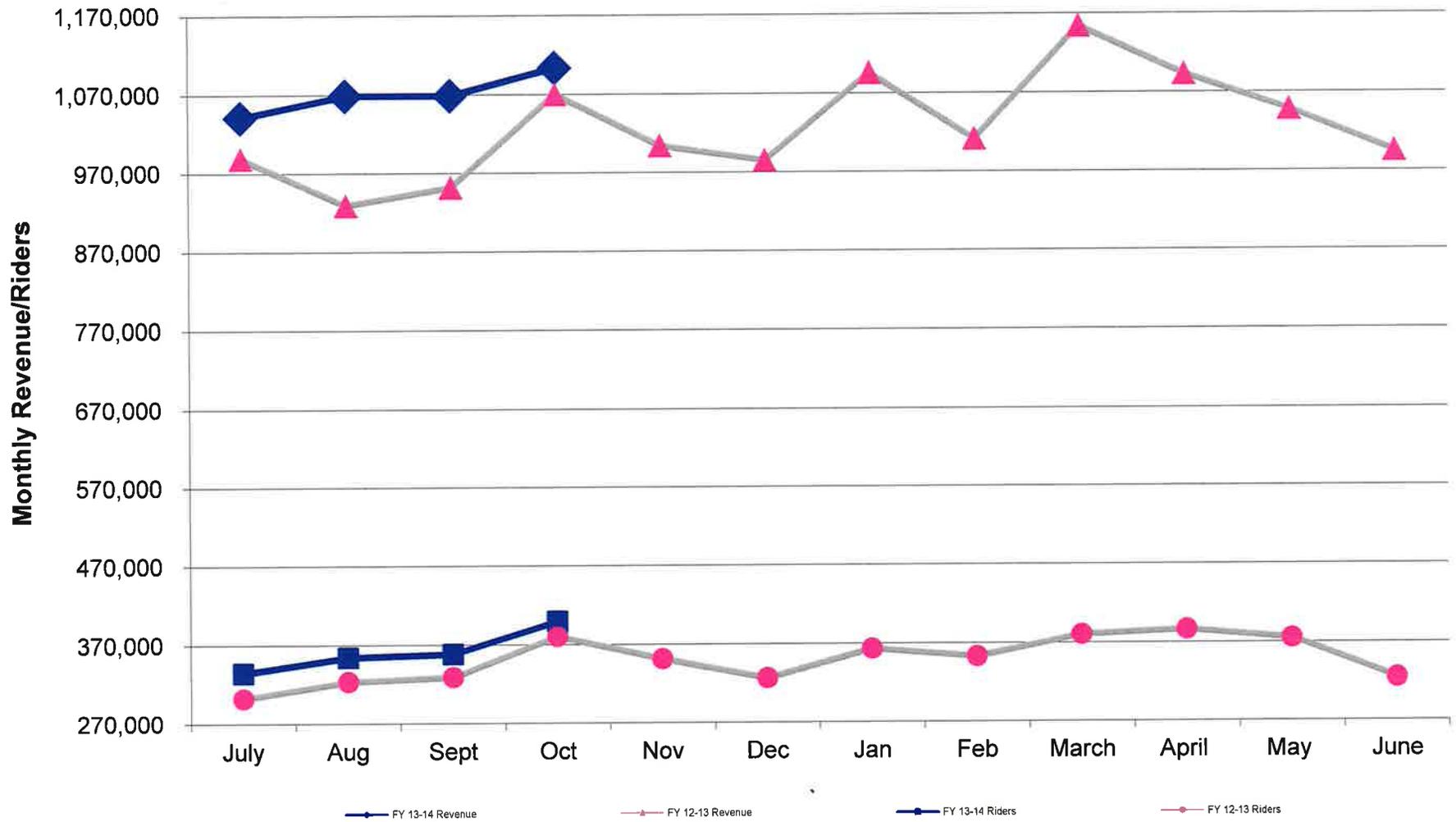


Chart 2 - SFRTA Riders

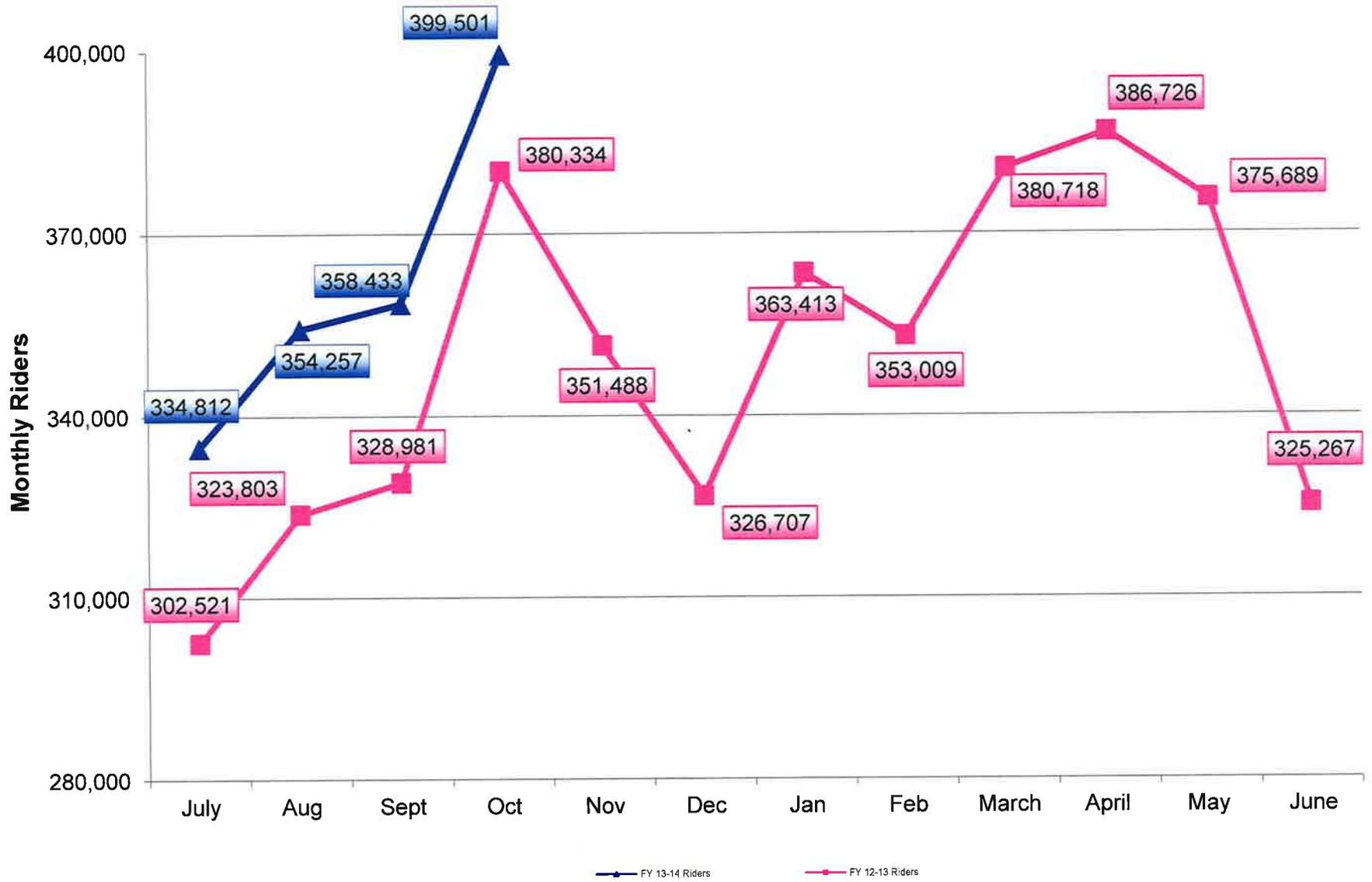
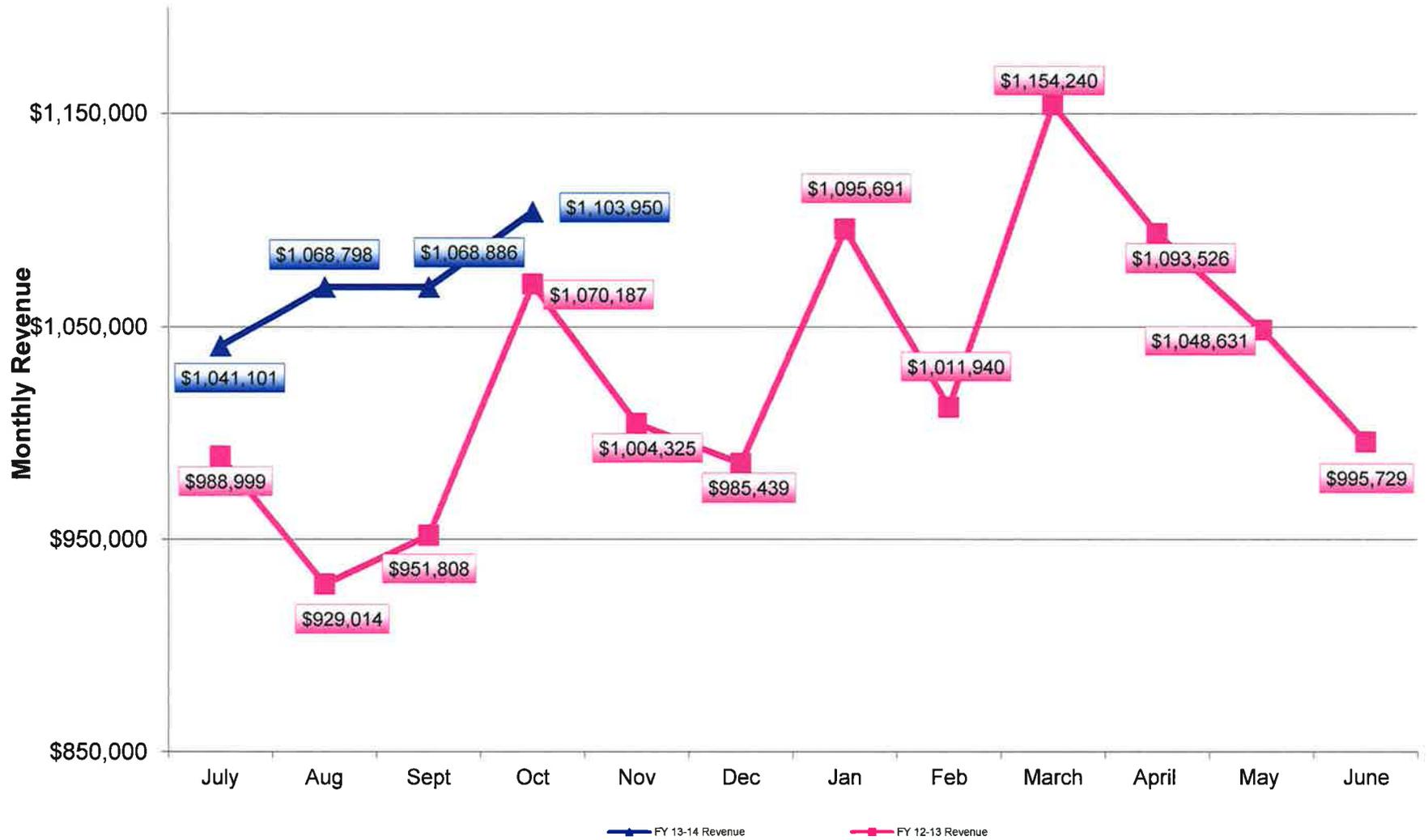


Chart 3 - SFRTA Revenue

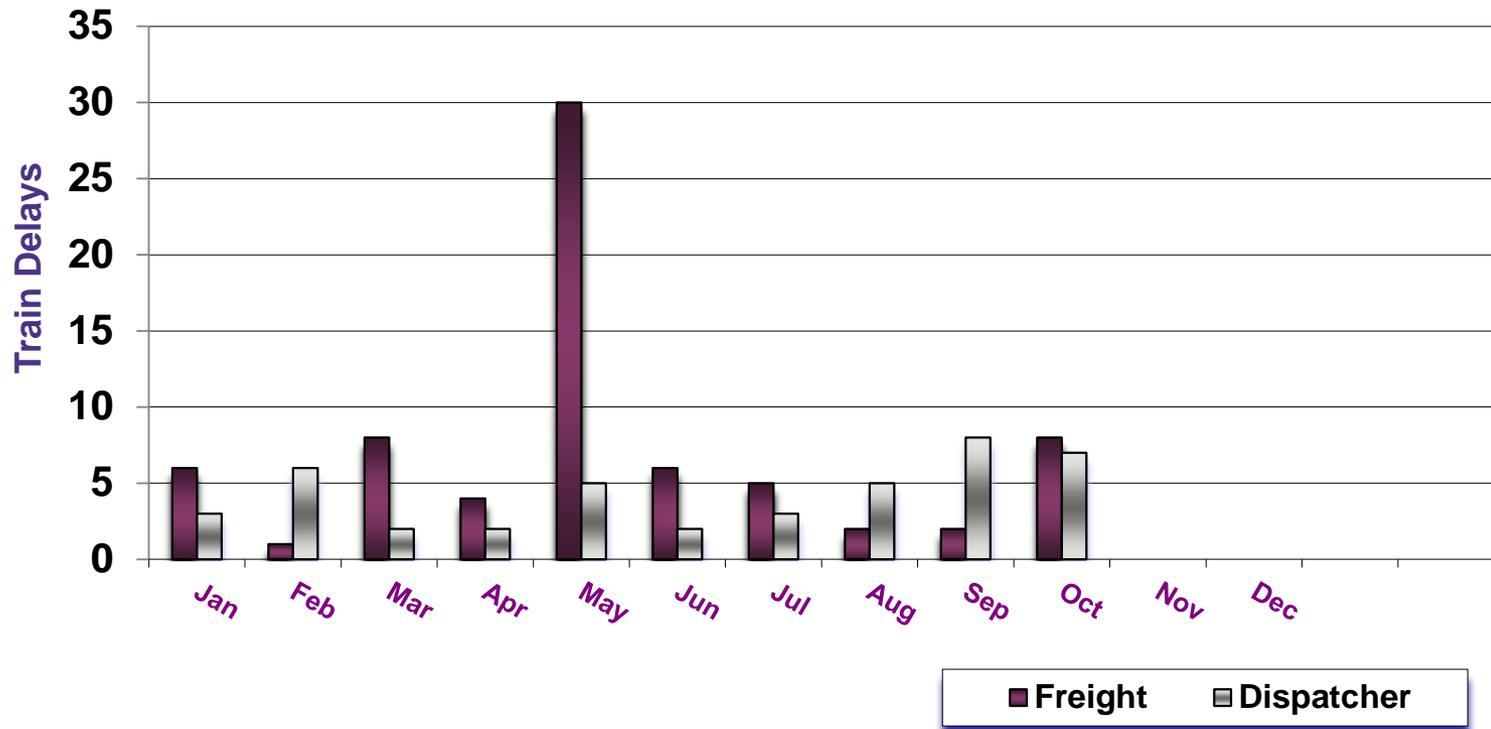

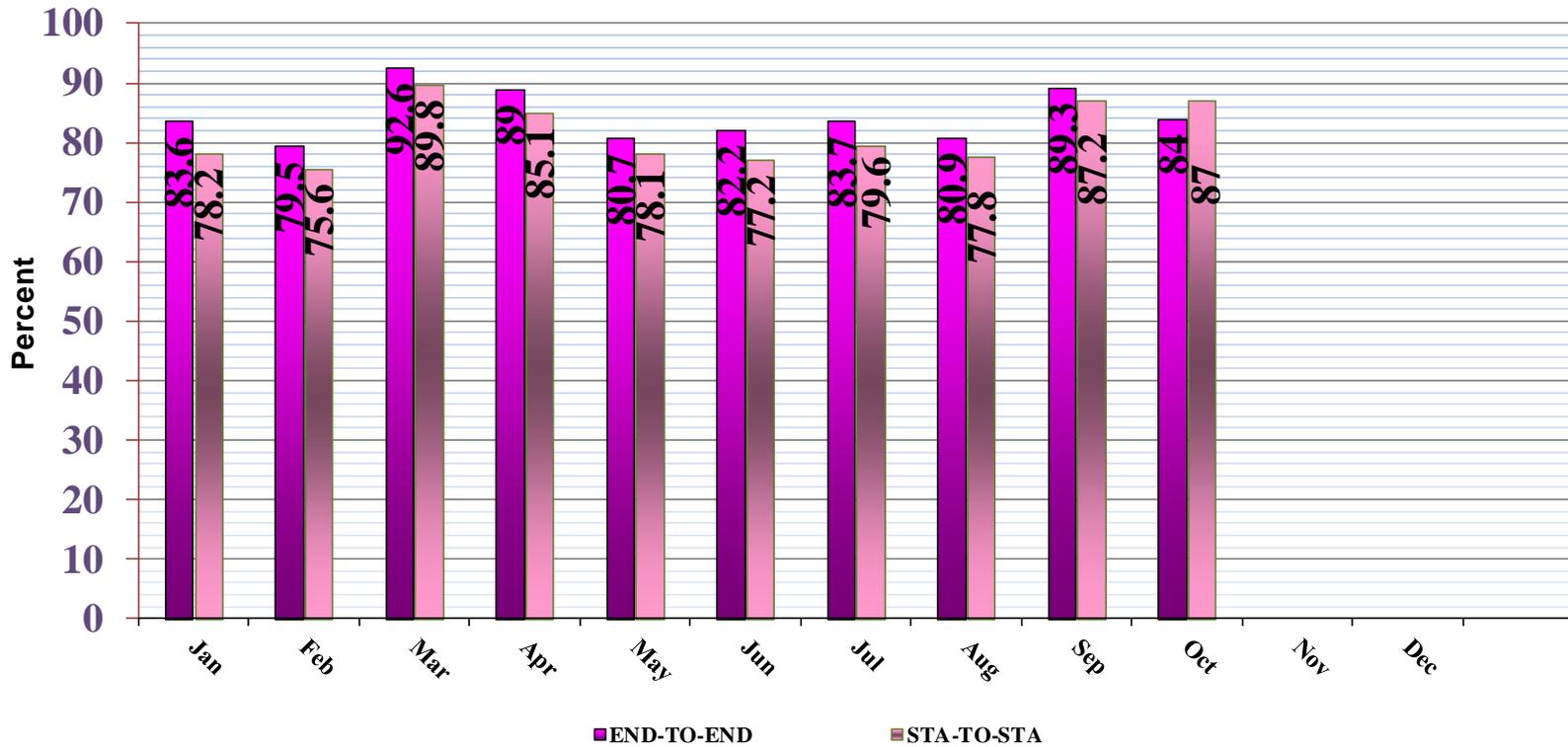


CSXT JAX Dispatcher & Freight / Local Switcher Delays 2013



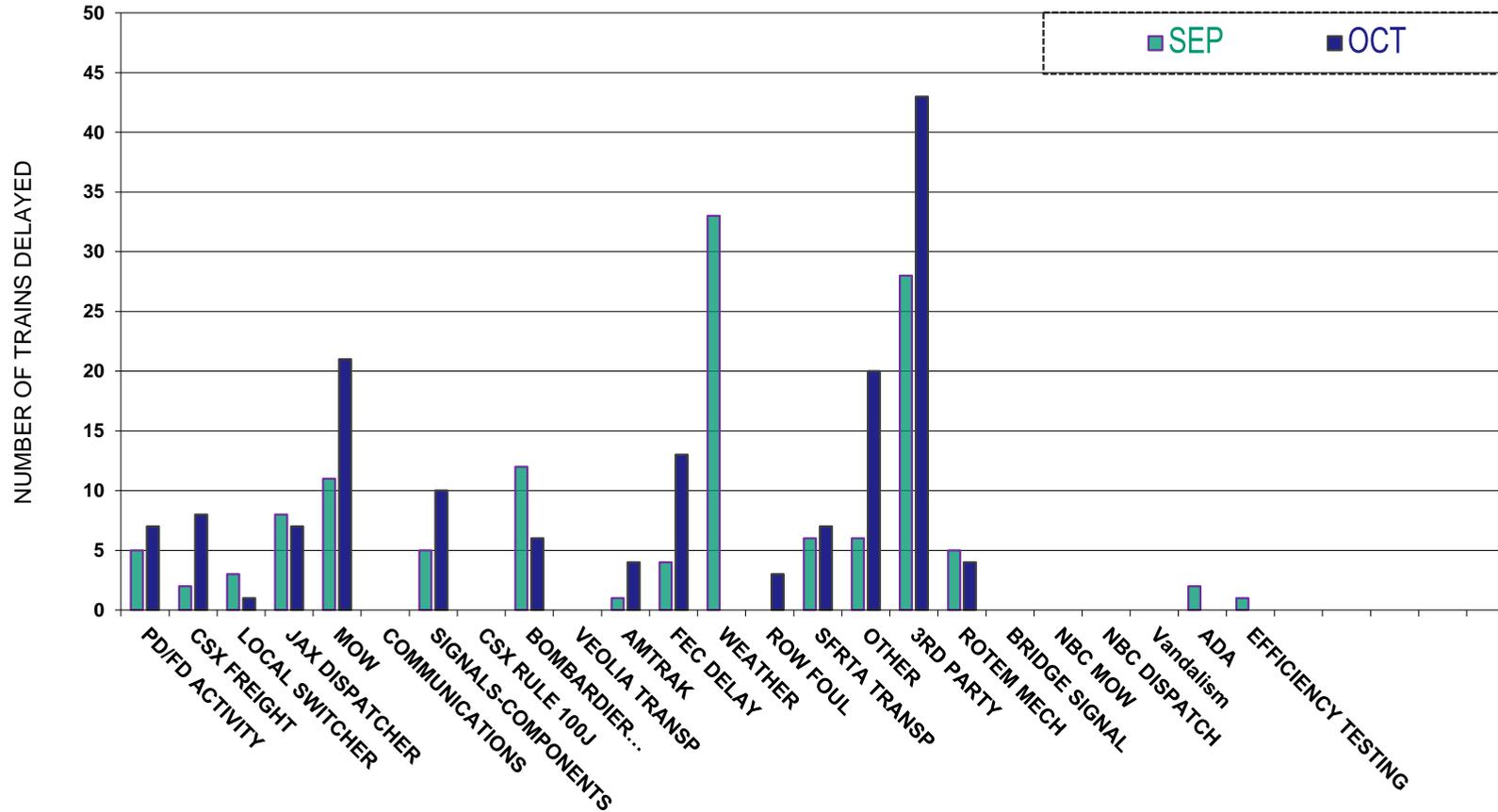


On-Time Performance Calendar Year 2013

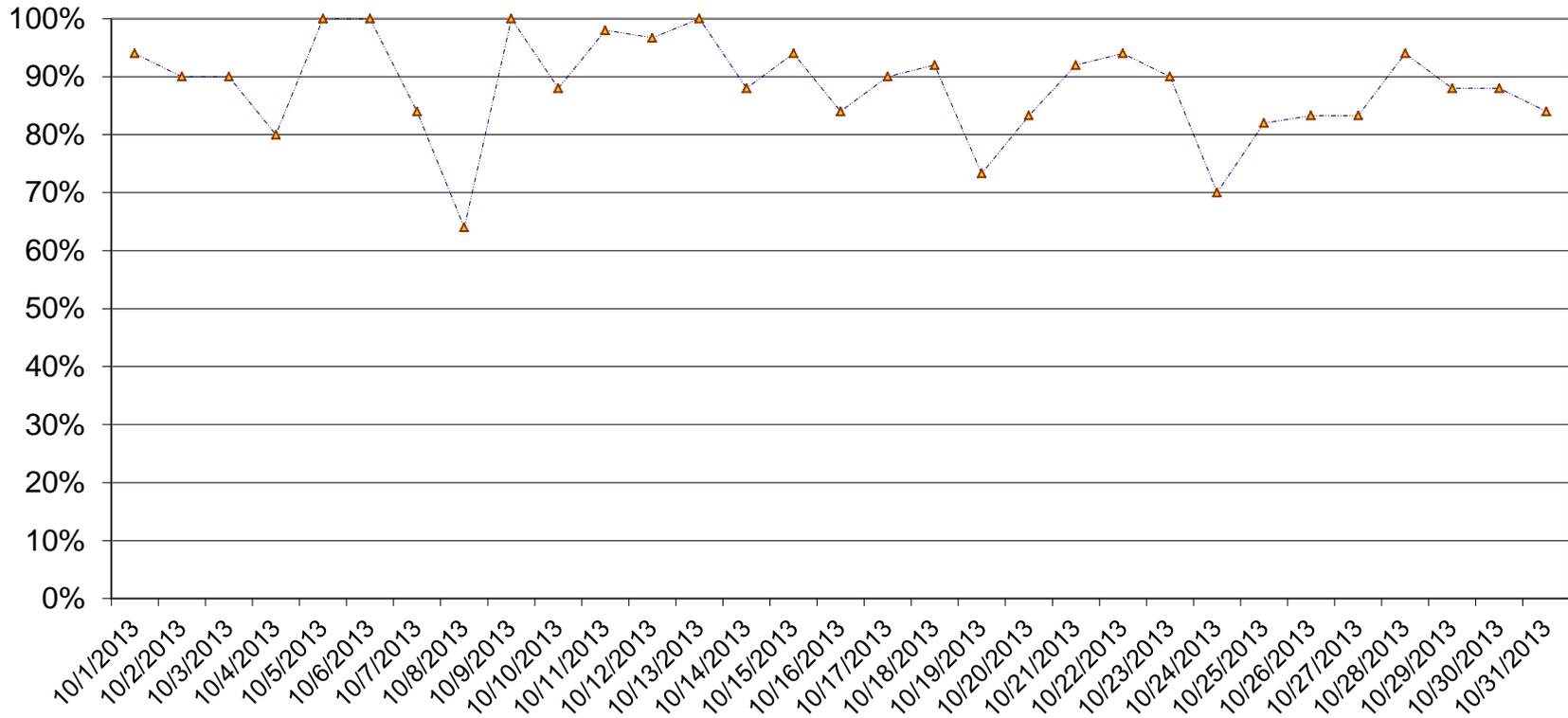




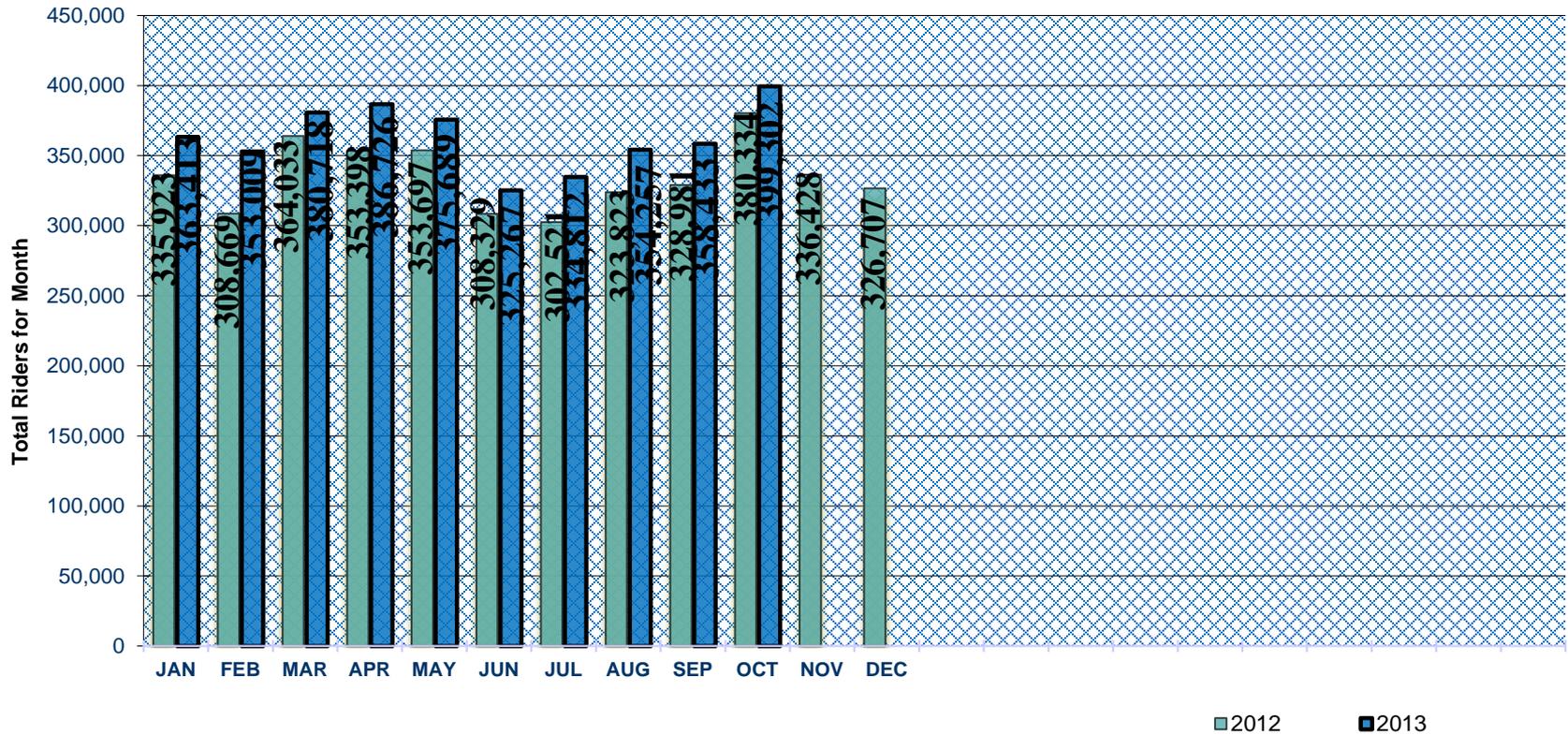
TRAIN DELAYS- 2013

CORPORATE AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH OFFICE SEPTEMBER ACTIVITIES:

APTA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) was represented during the American Public Transportation Association's Annual Meeting held in Chicago, IL, by the Corporate and Community Outreach Manager, along with the agency's Executive Director, General Counsel and Public Information Officer. The group accepted three first place AdWheel Awards, and a grand prize award for the Special Event category, honoring "Tri-Rail's Ride and Play Day." The grand prize-winning campaign was a regional effort to attract passengers to use Tri-Rail on a Saturday and take advantage of the new hourly weekend schedule, as well as discounts and prizes at some of the area's shopping and visitor centers.

BENEFIT FAIRS

South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) outreach staff was present at benefit fairs held at Associated Grocers in Pompano Beach, as well as Barry University and American Airlines in Miami. These companies are enrolled in the Employer Discount Program (EDP), so being available on the premises was advantageous in the effort to recruit more members to the program. Representatives from South Florida Commuter Services (SFCS) and Miami-Dade Metropolitan Planning Organization were also available at the Miami locations to provide information on other transportation options.

BIZ TO BIZ LEADS GROUP

The SFRTA sponsored a breakfast for the Greater Fort Lauderdale Chamber of Commerce's Biz to Biz Lead Group bi-weekly meeting held on September 19. At each meeting, a different group member gets the chance to sponsor and present its business to the group, in the effort to find good leads for their respective businesses. The Corporate and Community Outreach Manager has been a regular attendee in this group's meeting for the last few months, and was able to provide with details on the EDP, on-train advertisement and partnership opportunities. The group was also apprised of the current status of The Wave project, which directly affects their immediate area.

DOLPHINS SERVICE

The service agreement between SFRTA and the Miami Dolphins was kicked off on September 22, as the football team's home opener welcomed the added special shuttle bus service between Tri-Rail's Golden Glades Station and Sun Life Stadium. The shuttle carried 221 passengers to the game while 265 returned on the bus from the game to the station. Extra trains were in place to take the happy Dol-Fans home as their team won its third game in a row since starting the season.

PRESTIGE CRUISE HOLDINGS

SFRTA outreach staff was part of a Transportation Day hosted by Prestige Cruise Holdings in Miami, where representatives from SFCS, Miami-Dade MPO and City of Doral were available to promote alternate modes of transportation to their 200 employees.

RED BULL FLUGTAG MIAMI

The 2013 Red Bull Flugtag Miami was not affected by bad weather, which made many of the spectators happy to witness the popular event in Bayfront Park. The SFRTA had a partnership agreement with the event coordinators, in an effort to promote using Tri-Rail during the weekends to get to local events. Tri-Rail's ridership numbers were above average on the Saturday of the event with 6,738 passengers taking the train.

STUDENT ORIENTATIONS

SFRTA outreach staff joined with representatives from Broward County Transit (BCT) to attend both Broward College and Keiser University's new student orientations held at their Davie and Fort Lauderdale campuses, respectively. The venues proved useful to provide students with relevant Tri-Rail information, including student discount eligibility and free shuttle service available for both campuses.

Revenue:

Train Revenue

For October 2013 year-to-date (YTD) actual revenue increased approximately \$303,762 or 8% when compared to fiscal year (FY) 2014 YTD budgeted revenue. Actual revenue for FY 2014 YTD increased by \$299,076 or 8% when compared to FY 2013 YTD actual revenue. This increase is attributed to an increase in ridership.

Operating Assistance

The FY 2014 county contribution from Miami Dade for \$4,235,000 was received in October 2013.

Expenses:

As of October 2013, the SFRTA FY 2014 YTD actual expenses are \$3,539,210 or 14% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budgeted expense. All expenses are well within budget.

Train operations for FY 2014 YTD actual are approximately \$1,899,990 or 13% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and increased approximately \$912,873 or 8% when compared to FY 2013 YTD actual. This increase in FY 2014 can be attributed to an increase in Train Operations Contract, Fuel and Feeder Bus expense and a decrease in Insurance expense.

The major categories within Train Operations include Train Fuel, Operations Contract, Insurance and Feeder Service:

- Train Operations Contract expense for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$170,589 or 4% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget, and increased approximately \$400,804 or 12% when compared to FY 2013 YTD actual. This increase can be attributed to an increase in the base contract.

Expenses (Contd.)

- Train fuel expense for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$439,785 or 13% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget, and increased approximately \$133,005 or 5% when compared to FY 2013 YTD actual. This increase is attributed to rising fuel prices.
- Security contract expense for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$295,966 or 15% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and increased approximately \$115,883 or 7% when compared to FY 2013 YTD actual.
- Feeder bus expense for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$58,499 or 3% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and increased approximately \$562,113 or 36% when compared to FY 2013 YTD actual. This increase in FY 2014 can be attributed to a timing difference in recording the expense for the FY 2014 Palm Beach feeder service, which was fully expensed in October 2013.
- Insurance expense for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$420,363 or 58% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and decreased approximately \$384,160 or 56% when compared to the FY YTD 2013 actual due to a timing difference in recording the insurance expense.

Train and Station Maintenance for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$912,874 or 14% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and increased approximately \$986,627 or 20% when compared to the FY YTD 2013 actual. This increase can be attributed to an increase in Train and Station Maintenance expenses for the current month.

- Train Maintenance for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$763,011 or 13% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and increased approximately \$962,108 or 23% when compared to FY 2013 YTD actual. This increase in FY 2014 can be attributed to a higher amount of expenses monthly with our fleet maintenance contract.

Personnel Expenses for FY 2014 YTD actual are approximately \$307,499 or 9% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and increased approximately \$646,790 or 26% when compared to FY 2013 actual. The increase in FY 2014 is due to an additional pay period in October as well as salary increases in FY 2014.

Professional Services for FY 2014 YTD actual are approximately \$56,237 or 22% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and increased approximately \$17,840 or 10% when compared to FY 2013 actual.

Expenses (Contd.)

General and Administrative Expenses for FY 2014 YTD are approximately \$171,547 or 22% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and decreased approximately \$28,843 or 5% when compared to FY 2013 actual. Some categories within General and Administrative expenses are Business Travel, Office Supplies, and Seminars and Training.

- Business Travel expense for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$56,371 or 70% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and decreased approximately \$11,690 or 33% when compared to the FY 2013 YTD actual due to a decrease in business travel during the first quarter in FY 2014.
- Seminars and Training expense for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$41,202 or 85% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and decreased approximately \$12,519 or 63% when compared to FY 2013 actual. This decrease in FY 2014 is the result of a timing difference in recording the expenses in FY 2014.

Corporate & Community Outreach expenses for FY 2014 YTD actual are approximately \$47,646 or 23% below budget when compared to the FY 2014 YTD budget and increased approximately \$22,644 or 16% when compared to the FY 2013 YTD actual.

- Corporate & Community Outreach contract for FY 2014 YTD actual is approximately \$16,797 or 10% below budget when compared to the FY 2013 YTD budget and increased approximately \$25,119 or 20% when compared to the FY 2013 actual. This increase is attributed to higher expenses associated with the contract in October.

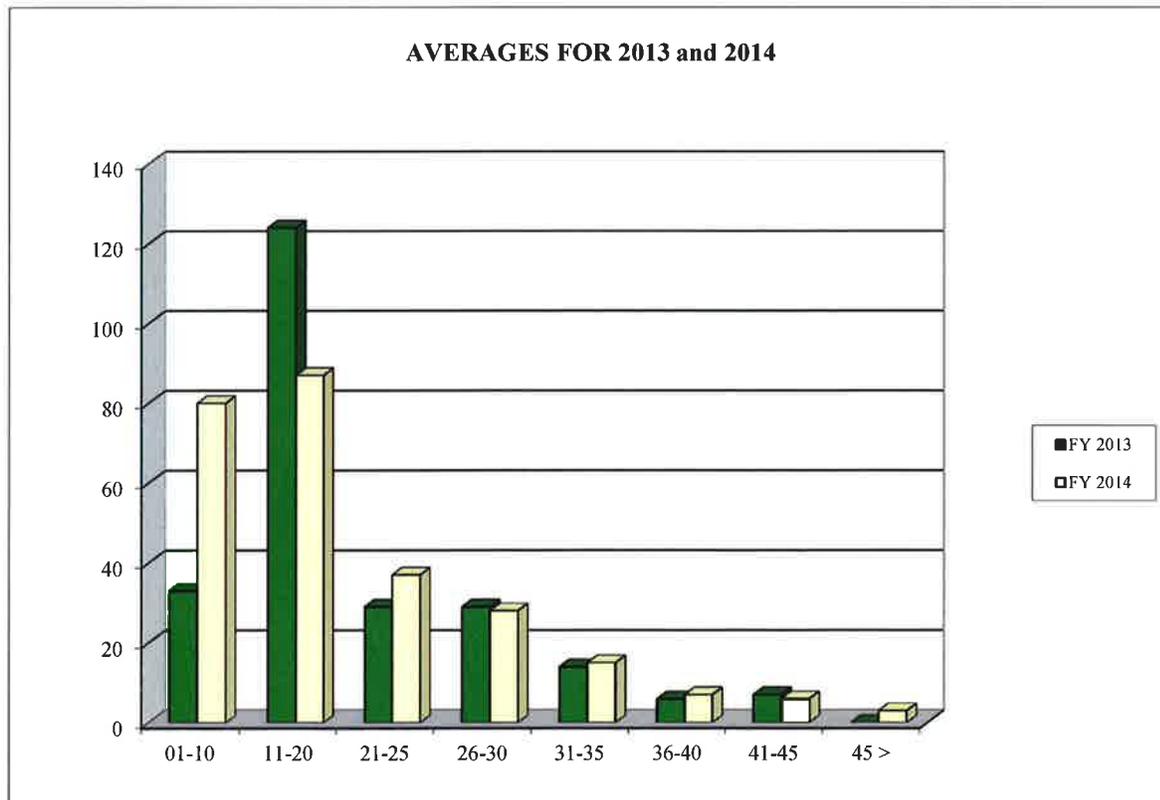
Accounts Payable processed 100.0% (58 checks) of the checks over \$2,500 within the 21-25 days. There were no invoices processed over 25 days for the month of October.

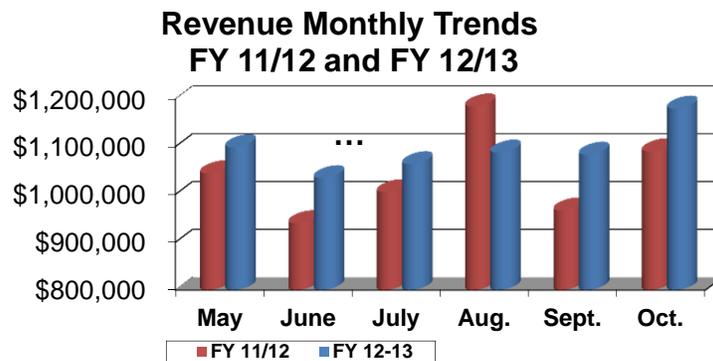

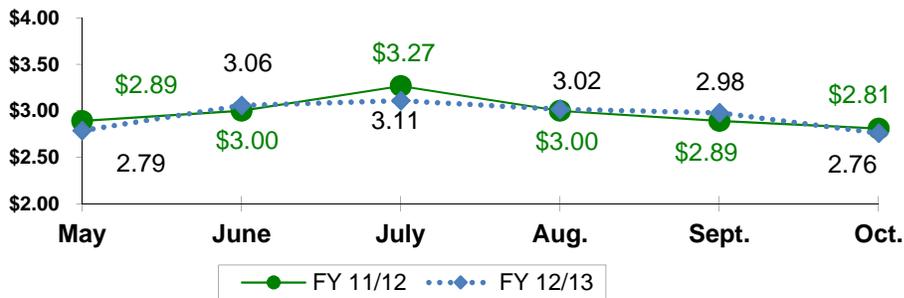

FY 11/12 and FY 12/13**



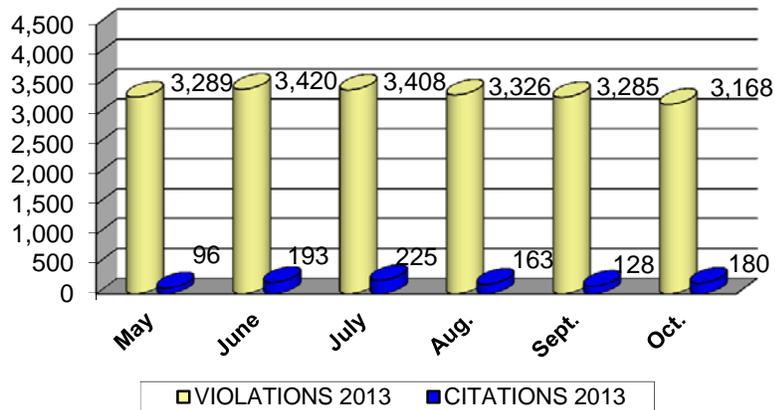

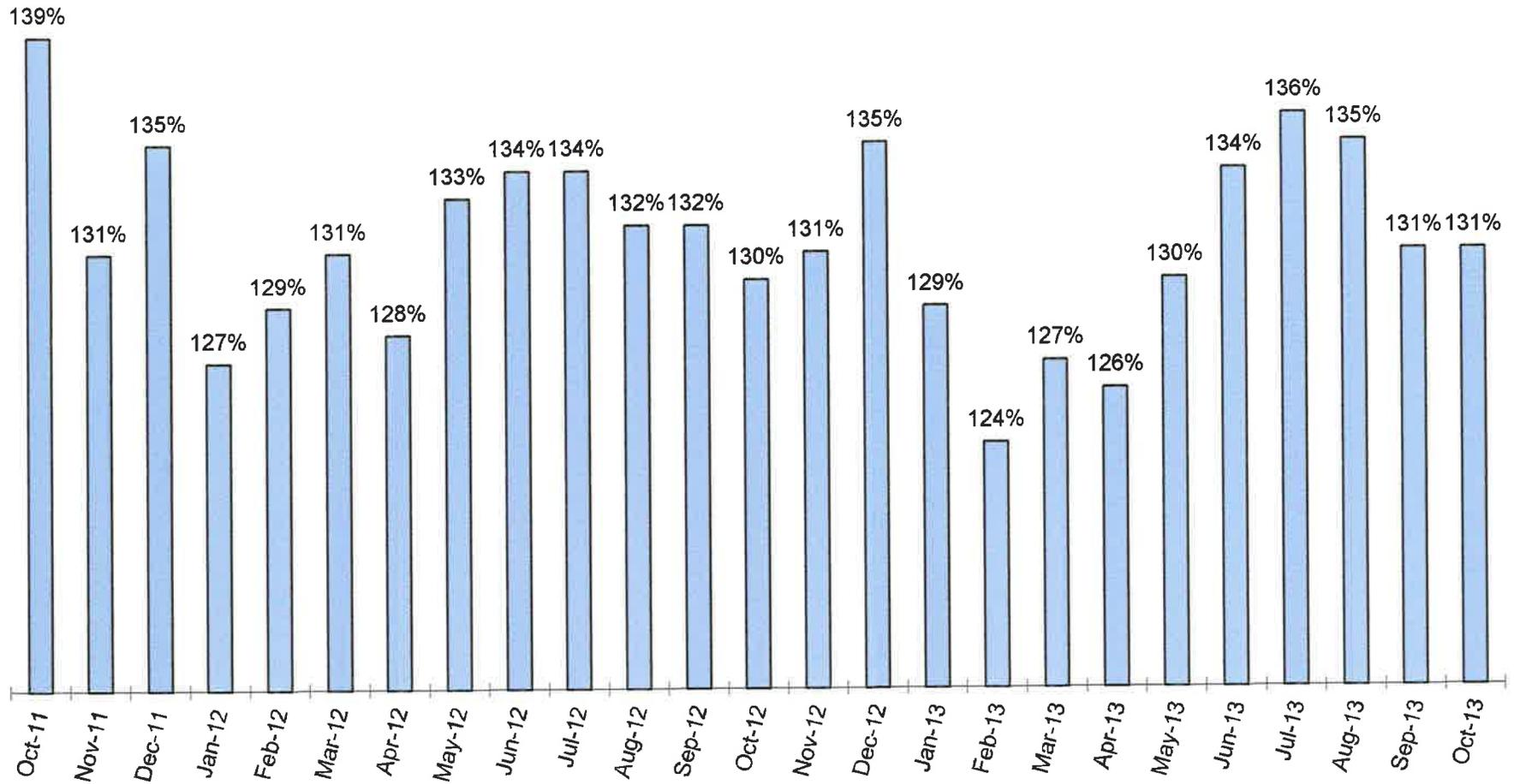

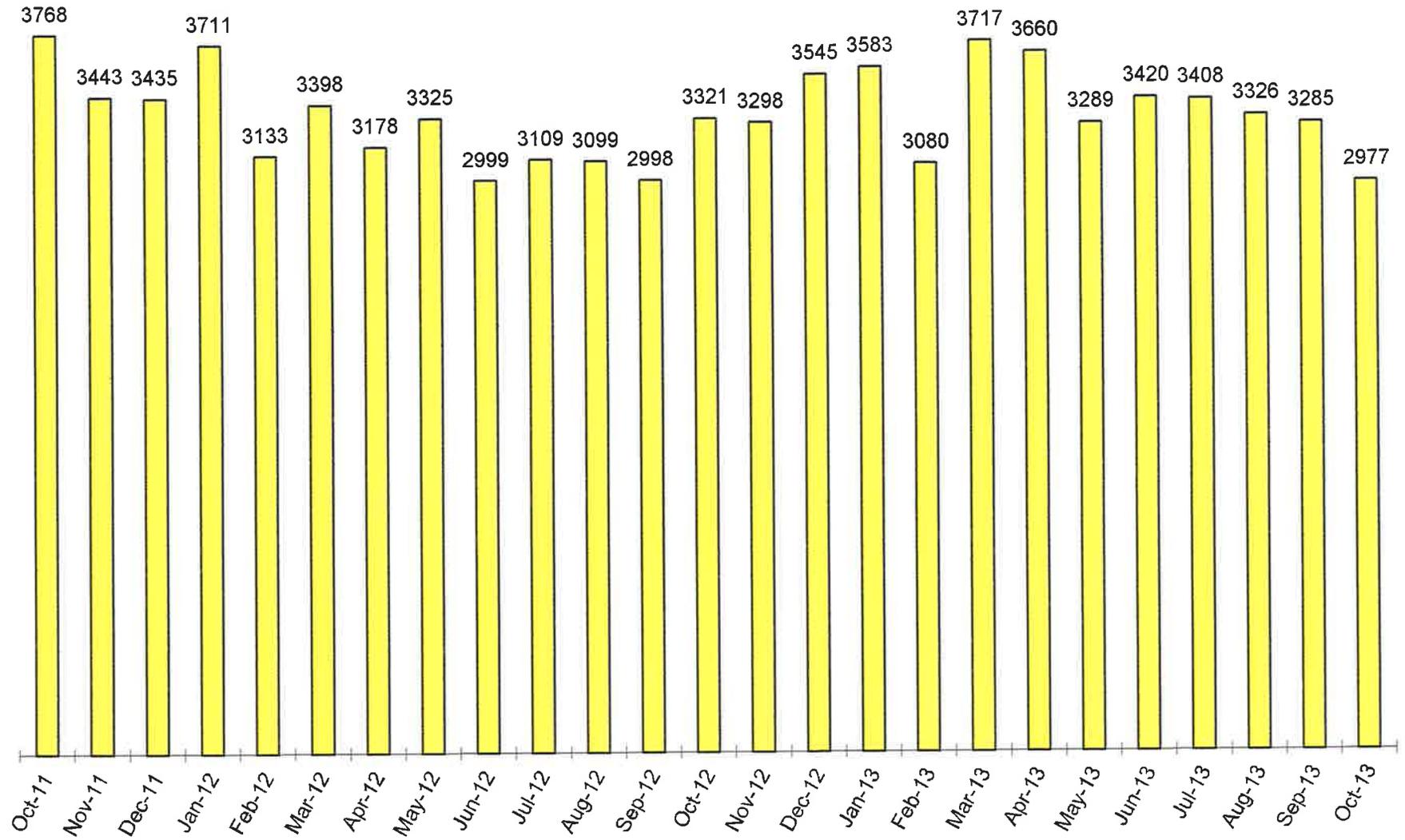

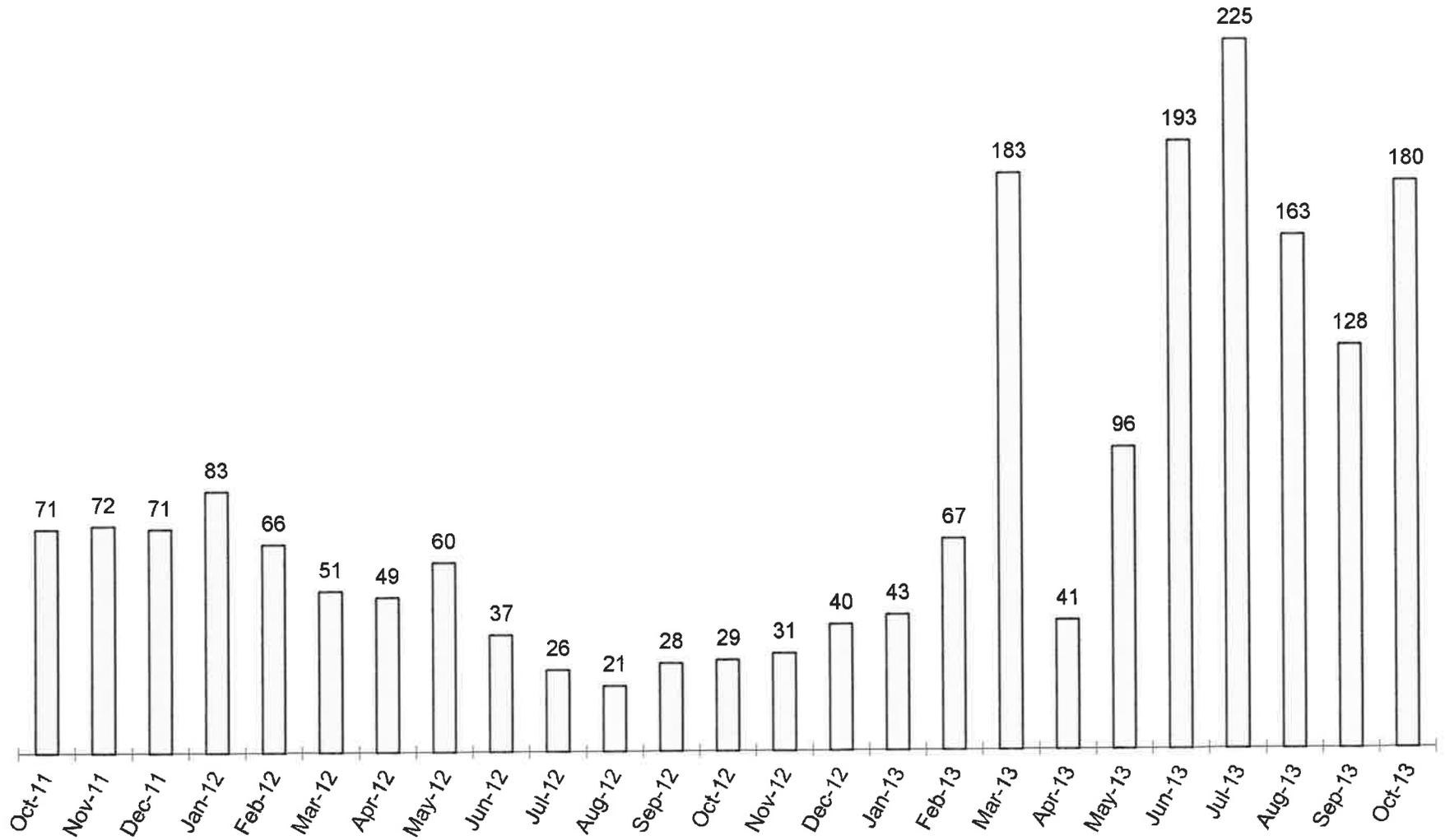
PERCENTAGE OF RIDERS INSPECTED
