Fortunately, Tri-Rail can get you to many of the premier malls and shopping districts in the region and leave you with some extra money to spend on gifts, instead of on gas.

Here are just a few of the most popular shopping destinations in the region. For more shopping locations that are accessible by train, check the Tri-Rail website or call Customer Service at 1-800-TRI-RAIL (874-7245).

### **CityPlace: 700 S. Rosemary Avenue, West Palm Beach.**

Take Tri-Rail to the West Palm Beach Station. Transfer to the free Green Line trolley on the Tamarind Avenue bus stop. Walk across the street to transfer to the free Yellow Line trolley at any point on Clematis Street between Rosemary Avenue and Quadrille Boulevard. Check the website for hours of operation for the trolleys, as they vary by day of the week. [OR](#) Transfer to Palm Tran Route 1 or Route 41 southbound and exit the bus at Hibiscus Street. Walk west to CityPlace.



### **Town Center Mall: 6000 W. Glades Road, Boca Raton.**

Take Tri-Rail to the Boca Raton Station. Transfer to the free BR 1 Tri-Rail Shuttle to the Town Center Mall transfer station. [OR](#) Transfer to Palm Tran Route 2 southbound.



### **Galleria Mall: 2414 E. Sunrise Boulevard, Fort Lauderdale.**

Take Tri-Rail to the Fort Lauderdale Station. Transfer to BCT Route 22 westbound.

**Dadeland Mall: 7535 N. Kendall Drive, Miami.** Take Tri-Rail to the Metrorail Transfer Station. Transfer to Metrorail southbound to the Dadeland North Station. Transfer to MDT Route 88 bus or walk approximately 2 blocks north to the mall.



**Bayside Marketplace: 401 Biscayne Boulevard, Miami.** Take Tri-Rail to the Metrorail Transfer Station. Transfer to Metrorail southbound and take it to the Government Center Station. Transfer to the Metromover and exit at the College/Bayside Station. Walk 2 blocks east.



## SFRTA CONSTRUCTS FIRST LEED-CERTIFIED STATION IN POMPANO BEACH

**I**t is undoubtedly the least attractive of the 18 stations on the South Florida Rail Corridor. Ironically, located at the SFRTA's Headquarters, it is the Pompano Beach Station. This is the last remaining vestige of the minimalist stations built when the system was placed into what was projected to be temporary service more than 20 years ago. With its narrow platforms, short canopies, and limited seating, the station is the bane of the some 200,000 passengers who use it annually. There is virtually no protection from Florida's beating sun and torrential summer rains.

Things are due to change in early 2013, however, when the SFRTA begins to demolish the station to make way for a new, Silver LEED-certified station. The project is made possible by an award of \$5.7 million through the Federal Transit Administration's TIGGER III grant program. The grant was one of only 46 to be awarded nationwide. The reconstructed station will serve as the prototype for the SFRTA's station-of-the-future.

### **LA SFRTA CONSTRUYE LA PRIMERA ESTACIÓN CON CERTIFICACIÓN LEED EN POMPANO BEACH**

**E**s, sin duda alguna, la estación menos atractiva de las 18 estaciones ubicadas en el Corredor ferroviario del Sur de la Florida. Irónicamente, ubicada en la Oficina central de la Autoridad Regional de Transporte del Sur de la Florida (SFRTA) se trata de la estación de Pompano Beach. Es el

último vestigio que queda de las estaciones minimalistas construidas cuando el sistema se estableció en lo que estaba proyectado para ser un servicio temporario hace más de 20 años. Con sus estrechas plataformas, pequeños toldos y asientos limitados, la estación es la pesadilla de los 200.000 pasajeros que deben utilizarla durante todo el año. Virtualmente, no existe ningún tipo de protección contra el intenso sol y las lluvias torrenciales de verano de la Florida.

Sin embargo, la situación cambiará a principios de 2013, cuando la SFRTA comience a demoler la estación para dar paso a una nueva estación con certificación LEED Plata. El proyecto se hizo posible gracias a una subvención de \$5,7 millones otorgada a través del programa de subvención TIGGER III de la Administración Federal de Tránsito. La subvención fue una de solo 46 que se otorgaron a nivel nacional. La estación reconstruida servirá como prototipo de la estación del futuro de la SFRTA.

“Al igual que los autos accionados por electricidad que recargan las baterías y las baterías regeneran la electricidad a medida que se necesita, eso es básicamente lo que ocurrirá aquí”, estableció el Director Ejecutivo de la SFRTA, Joseph Giulietti. “Se contará con energía solar que permitirá la carga de vehículos y el sistema de batería de reserva, además del suministro de energía para toda la estación”. Los paneles solares suministrarán el 110% de la energía

necesaria para hacer funcionar la estación.

Entre otros complementos agregados a la estación, se encuentran una vegetación nativa que requiere un riego menos frecuente, un paso elevado para que los pasajeros puedan cruzar de una plataforma a otra sin tener que cruzar a nivel del piso, y elevadores energéticamente eficientes para acceder al puente peatonal. La estación, asimismo, suministrará nuevos casilleros de seguridad para bicicletas, estacionamiento especializado para vehículos con fuente de combustible alternativa, estacionamiento para transporte colectivo/transporte en vehículo compartido, dispositivos de iluminación por LED y un estacionamiento reacondicionado cubierto.

Avèk platfòm etwat li yo, kanope kout yo, ak plas limite, estasyon se mwayen kèk 200,000 pasaje ki itilize li chak ane. Pa gen

pwoteksyon vityèl nan solèy cho Florida ak lapli sezón lete ki vini avèk kouran dlo.

Men, bagay yo dwe chanje nan kòmansman ane 2013, lè SFRTA ap kòmanse kraze estasyon an pou kreye fason pou yon nouvo estasyon Silver LEED sètifye. Pwojè a vin posib gras ak yon sibvansyon \$5.7 milyon dola nan pwogram sibvansyon TIGGER Administrasyon Federal pou Transpò Komen. Sibvansyon an se te youn nan sèlman 46 yo bay toupatou nan peyi a. Estasyon y ap re-konstwi a ap sèvi kòm yon modèl pou estasyon fiti SFRTA.

Direktè Egzekitif SFRTA, Joseph Giulietti, di konsa, “Nan menm fason ou gen vwati ki fonksyone avèk kouran elektrik ki rechaje batri yo, epi batri yo re-pwodui kouran elektrik jan ou bezwen li, se sa ki pral fèt isit la anjeneral. W ap gen enèji solè k ap pèmèt ou chaje veyikil yo ak sistèm batri sipò, epi k ap bay enèji nan estasyon an kòm yon ansanm.” Pano solè yo ap bay 110% enèji ki nesèsè pou opere estasyon an.
